The Foundation of Forgiveness

amilies should stick together. Families should watch each other's backside. Families should stand together against outside threats, and stay close during difficult times. But sometimes that doesn't always happen.

In the book of Genesis, the great man Joseph had done nothing wrong against his brothers. He simply had tried to obey God, obey his father, and treat his brothers fairly. Jealousy got the better of his brothers and they turned on Joseph. The men he grew up admiring, respecting, and trying to be like turned on him in a savage way.

Joseph's brothers stripped him of his favorite coat, threw him in a pit, considered killing him, then sold him into slavery and told their father he was eaten by a wild animal. Some family! But all would not be lost as Joseph soon rose to be a very powerful ruler in Egypt, with God's help. Soon Joseph's brothers were seeking his help, and begging for his mercy. If there ever were a chance for revenge, this was it.

How did Joseph respond? He forgave them, mourned the time he'd missed with them, and offered to provide for their needs. What caused Joseph to forgive his brothers? He had learned the value of forgiveness and mercy.

One of the most difficult things to do is choose to forgive rather than seek revenge. Joseph had the power to punish his brothers for how they treated him and some would say he had every right to do so, but he chose instead to forgive his family. Like Joseph, none of our families are perfect. We all have struggles and difficulties, but if we desire to set a godly foundation for our families, we must learn to forgive each other.

You know better than anyone how difficult forgiving family members can be. The ones who are closest to you can hurt you the most. But God's desire is for your family to be a place of forgiveness, grace, and restoration. You won't feel like forgiving the loved one who wronged you, but just as God forgave you of your offenses against Him, so you can forgive your family members. The Bible says, *"Be ye kind one to another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, even as God for Christ's sake hath forgiven you."* (Eph. 4:32)

Jesus is our example in every area of our lives. We look to Him for guidance in how to live godly lives on this earth. When it comes to forgiveness, His example is clearforgive others as He has forgiven us. Others don't deserve forgiveness for their wrong doings. But in the same way, we don't deserve eternal life and forgiveness of sins. God has way more grace than we have sin.

How forgiving are you when a family member hurts you? This can be humbling, but don't become so prideful that you hold on to anger and hurt. With Jesus' example in mind, offer forgiveness when others wrong you.

Editor's Note: The **Bible** is very clear that if you and I are not willing to *forgive* <u>neither</u> shall you and I be *forgiven!* You see that 'forgiveness' is a matter of the 'heart' (will), not the emotions. "And forgive us our debts (trespasses), as we forgive our debtors (trespass). For if you forgive men their trespasses, your heavenly Father will also forgive you. But if you do not forgive men their trespasses,

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neither will your Father forgive your trespasses." Matt. 6:12, 14-25. "So My heavenly Father also will do to you if each of you, from his heart, does not forgive his brother his trespasses." Matthew 18:35. "And whenever you stand praying, if you have anything against anyone, forgive him, that your Father in heaven may also forgive you your trespasses. But if you do not forgive, neither will your Father in heaven forgive your trespasses." Mark 11:25-26.

Please let me share one more Bible verse at this time, which is so important; "bearing with one another, and forgiving one another, if anyone has a complaint against another, even as Christ forgave you, so you also must do." Colossians 3:13.

If we view our circumstances through the lens of Scripture - then our weeping will one day turn to rejoicing!

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"Accepted in the beloved" Ephesians 1:6

What a state of privilege! It includes our *justification* before God, but the term "acceptance" in the Greek means more than that. It signifies that we are the objects of *divine*

complacence, nay, even of divine delight. How marvelous that we, worms, mortals, sinners, should be the objects of divine love! But it is only "in the beloved." Some Christians seem to be accepted in their own experience, at least, that is their apprehension. When their spirit is lively, and their hopes bright, they think God accepts them, for they feel so high, so heavenly-minded, so drawn above the earth! But when their souls cleave to the dust, they are the victims of the fear that they are no longer accepted. If they could but see that all their high joys do not exalt them, and all their low despondencies do not really depress them in their Father's sight, but that they stand accepted in One who never alters, in One who is always the beloved of God, always perfect, always without spot or wrinkle, or any such thing, how much happier they would be, and how much more they would honor the Savior! Rejoice then, believer, in this: thou art accepted "in the beloved."

Thou lookest within, and thou sayest, not everything acceptable *there*. Thy sins trouble thee; but God has cast thy sins behind his back, and thou are accepted in the Righteous One. Thou hast to fight with corruption, and to wrestle with temptation, but thou art already accepted in him who has overcome the powers of evil. The devil tempts thee; be of good cheer, he cannot destroy thee, for thou art accepted in him who has broken Satan's head. Know by full assurance thy glorious standing. Even glorified souls are not more accepted than thou art. They are only accepted in heaven "in the beloved," and thou art even now accepted in Christ after the same manner.

Of Sin and Salvation!

The moral issue and the subject of repentance always appear in scriptural faith. Biblical faith is thus unlike the other religions of the world. Others have their rules and may be allergic to certain things they consider wrong, but they do not have that great moral standard symbolized by the Ten Commandments and supplemented by the teaching of the Scriptures in general.

Before the Babylonian captivity, a besetting sin with the Israelites was their tendency to yield to the more popular forms of idolatry in order to keep up with the times. Under Baal worship, they had made some clever moves to unite or blend the false religion with the true. We have noted that one thing Babylonian captivity did for the Jews was to set them free from everything that resembles idolatry. But until one is saved in his heart, he usually gives up one sin to adopt another. Selected.

Five Definite Attributes Define the Deity of Christ

1. God is Omnipotent. Omnipotence is also ascribed to Jesus. While He was upon the earth, He had power over disease and death, over the winds and the waves.

2. God is Omniscient. This attribute is ascribed to Jesus. The woman at the well found out that Jesus knew all the secrets of her heart. God is the only one who possesses all knowledge, so we know that Christ is God.

3. God is Omnipresent. He is at all places at the same time. It is even so with Jesus. He tells us that He will be wherever two or three are gathered together in His name. He tells believers that He will be with them "even unto the end of the world" (Matt. 28:20), wherever they may be. He is at all places at all times.

4. God is Eternal. In Genesis 1:1, we read the words, "In the beginning (was) God." In John 1:1, God says, "In the beginning was the Word." God told Moses to say "I AM hath sent me" (Exod. 3:14). Jesus said, "Before Abraham was, I am" (John 8:58).

5. God is Immutable. He never changes. But we also read of Jesus that He is "the same yesterday, and to day, and for ever." Jesus possesses every characteristic of God; therefore, He is God.

The best piece of acting is but acting; those who only look at appearances may be pleased by it, but lovers of reality will be disgusted. What presumption! What hypocrisy it is by skillful management of the voice to mimic the passion which is the genuine work of the Holy Ghost!

Let mere actors beware lest they be found sinning against the Holy Spirit by their theatrical performances. We must be earnest in the pulpit because we are earnest everywhere; we must laze in our discourses because we are continually on fire. Zeal which is stored up to be let off only on grand occasions is a gas which will one day destroy its proprietor. Nothing but truth may appear in the house of the Lord; all affectation is strange fire and excites the indignation of the God of truth.

Be earnest, and you will seem to be earnest. A burning heart will soon find for itself a flaming tongue. To sham earnestness is one of the most contemptible of dodges for courting popularity; let us abhor the very thought. Go and be listless in the pulpit if you are so in your heart. Be slow in speech, drawling in tone and monotonous in voice, if so you can best express your soul. Even that would be infinitely better than to make your ministry a masquerade and yourself an actor.

Abraham did not know where he was going. And yet he went, for God had told him to go. This was faith; for faith is obedience.



ELCA Folks, Listen To This Man

I was honored to make the acquaintance of Bishop Michael C. D. McDaniels, former ELCA bishop of the North Carolina Synod, Director of the Center of Theology at Lenior-Rhyne College, Hickory, North Carolina, and a member of the ELCA Church Council. Throughout his tenure as Bishop of North Carolina (1982-1999), McDaniel had been an ardent supporter of the ELCA and an opponent of anyone who believed in the inerrancy of Scripture. Yet, several years prior to his death in 2004, the Bishop had a radical transformation, a conversion if you please. He came to love the Bible as God's "inspired, infallible and inerrant Word of God," and he came to see the ELCA as a threat to authentic Lutheranism.

McDaniel's conversion for me was akin to the Apostle

Paul's conversion and the reaction of people in the early Church to his conversion. McDaniel once attacked me for my beliefs regarding the inspiration and inerrancy of Scripture. Here are but a few excerpts of a speech McDaniel gave at Concordia Seminary in St. Louis:

"You are surely aware that the ELCA has been taken over by the very people our parents warned us not to play with when we were little. It is only now that the majority of our members are beginning, slowly and reluctantly, to realize that the persons writing our literature and directing our programs are hijackers, and that this church, once so dear, so wonderful, so shining with grace and glory, is way off course. As more and more people awaken to this fact, there are increasing distresses and demands that the leaders faithfully lead.

"To put human sexual gratification above the Commandments of God and the clear teaching of Scripture is simply unthinkable; yet, without any ELCA leader to say a clear "no," there is a continuing push for the ordination of homosexuals as if they were marriages. Furthermore, as long as the ELCA health insurance program covers abortions, a percentage of each Sunday's offering presented before the altar of the Lord is going to finance murder.

"In view of these and other matters in which the ELCA bows to the paganizing of the church, we must ask whether this ELCA that we are so benevolently offering to share with other denominations any longer qualifies as bona fide Lutheranism. Indeed, is it a Christian church?

"In the study of God's word, the Pandora's Box of the higher-critical method (as professor Lawrence Rast has called it) must be firmly shut and thrown away. Much ink has been spilled over whether or not the problem is the method itself or those who have used it. But, in any case, let us avoid it. For, as the saying goes in the mountains of North Carolina, "if you lie down with dogs, you'll get up with fleas." I have dedicated the remainder of my life to attempting to open the eyes of my brothers and sisters in the ELCA to the liberating, glorious truth of the infallible, inerrant word of God."

"That by two immutable things, in which it is impossible for God to lie, we might have strong consolation who have fled for refuge to lay hold of the hope set before us. This hope we have as an anchor of the soul, both sure and steadfast; and which enters the Presence behind the veil." (Hebrews 6:18 - 19)

HOPE has a lot to do with life as we journey from 'hurdle' to possibly a 'mountain top experience' (A person who has NO 'hope' is in a 'hopeless position' in their opinion). We 'hope' for those who we appreciate and love; including the *economy*, the moral decay, etc. for our beloved USA; as righteousness exalteth a nation and sin is a reproach unto any people! We 'hope' for a good job, education, position, health, retirement, etc. which is not wrong in itself. HOPE builds upon the solidity of God's Word and is not a desperate grasping in the air; BUT a certainty, it is a blessed, purifying, comforting assurance knowing that God's Word is forever settled in Heaven! Absolute certainty because GOD will never change, nor HIS PROMISES! (Being God will never change - neither will His Promises). We have an 'anchor' of the soul, both steadfast and sure IN CHRIST JESUS!

The noun "hope" when used in the New Testament, does not imply a wishful attitude, but rather a joyous and confident expectation in that which is promised will come to pass. For example: in a sports activity we 'hope' that our team will win. No doubt many times it is with enthusiasm, expectation and anticipation; but that does not guarantee 'us' that they will win! Yes, a good attitude is important, but it does not guarantee an absolute win!

There were a 'few' people in the New Testament time who were looking for the coming of the promised Messiah after 400 years of 'silence'; yet resting on the surety of the Promise of God for HE can not lie! "God is not a man, that He should lie. Nor a son of man, that He should repent. Has He said, and will He not do? Or has He spoken, and will He not make it good?" Numbers 23:19

When we speak 'frequently' of the coming of the LORD; Jesus did not speak of His coming for speculation or debate particularly; BUT with the purpose in mind to exhort and encourage us to live a godly life. "And now, little children, abide in Him, that when He appears, we may have confidence and not be ashamed before Him at His coming. Beloved, what manner of love the Father has bestowed on us, that we should be called children of God! Therefore the world does not know us, because it did not know Him. And everyone who has this hope in him purifies himself, just as He is pure." I John 2:28, 3:1 & 3:3. WE are to be "looking for the blessed

hope and glorious appearing of our great God and Savior Jesus Christ, who gave Himself for us, that He might redeem us from every lawless deed and purify for Himself His own special people, zealous for good works" Titus 2:13-14. This is an **active and alive HOPE:** "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who according to His abundant mercy has begotten us again to a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead" I Peter 1:3.

In the meantime We are to be 'occupying till HE comes'! Saved by GRACE – we are saved to Serve! "For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand that we should walk in them" Ephesians 2:10.

Just think of the LOST who are facing a hopeless ETERNITY!!! "'He who believes in Him is not condemned; but he who does not believe is condemned already, because he has not believed in the name of the only begotten Son of God. He who believes in the Son has everlasting life; and he who does not believe the Son shall not see life, but the wrath of God abides on him'' John 3:18 & 36. (Where IN Scripture do you find that you are to be a 'friend' before you witness to others? YES, the love of Christ constrains you/me!

Texas Education Board Approves Ban on "Pro-Islam" Textbooks

In a narrow vote, the Texas State Board of Education (SBOE) ...approved a controversial resolution that calls for the rejection of text books that are "pro-Islamic, anti-Christian."

The resolution passed in a 7-6 vote during a reportedly contentious meeting. Although the resolution has no impact on current standards, it sends a warning to publishers that Texas – the nation's second largest textbook market – will reject all schoolbooks that are favorably biased toward Islam while painting Christianity in an unfavorable light.

"This resolution will ensure up front that potential biases are taken care of before these books reach the board," said board Chairwoman Gail Lowe, according to the *Dallas Morning News*.

On Friday, the 13-member panel - two were absent considered a resolution authored by Randy Rives, who is not a board member, which would prevent future Texas social studies textbooks from containing religious bias, specifically between Islam and Christianity...

The impact of the SBOE's decision is expected to be felt nationwide. Publishers usually cater to the textbook demands of the larger states and offer those schoolbooks to students in smaller states. Texas is the second-largest textbook market in the country, behind California.

Appeals Court Lets ESCR Funding Continue

A federal appeals court ruled ...that government funding of embryonic stem cell research may continue while a legal challenge to the Obama administration's policy on the ...experimentation goes forward.

A three-judge panel of the D.C. Circuit Court of Appeals granted a new suspension of a federal judge's August 23 ruling that had halted funding of embryonic stem cell research (ESCR) under guidelines published last year by the National Institute of Health (NIH). President Obama had issued an executive order earlier in 2009 overturning a more restrictive funding policy and ordering NIH to devise guidelines consistent with his decree.

The ability of stem cells to convert to other cells and tissues has provided great hope for developing cures for various diseases, but extracting stem cells from an embryo results in the destruction of the days-old human being. ESCR has not proven as effective as other forms of stem cell experiments that do not harm the donor. It has yet to provide any treatments for human beings and has been plagued by tumors in lab animals.

THOUUGHTFUL PRAISES

(Read Psalm 47)

God is the King of all the earth; sing praises with understanding - Psalm 47:7

I wonder what God thinks about the way we sing at church. I'm not talking about the quality of our voices, but the honesty of our words. If we're being truthful, the following rewritten hymn titles might more accurately express what's in our hearts as we sing:

"Just As I Am" is "Just As I Pretend To Be." "O How I Love Jesus: becomes "O How I Like Jesus." "I Surrender All" is actually, "I Surrender Some."

"He's Everything To Me" means "He's Quite A Bit To Me."

Jesus said that we are to worship Him in truth (John 4:24). Singing sincerely and with understanding is a serious challenge (Psalm 47:7).

Let's take up the challenge by seeking God's help to make the original titles of these hymns true for us. In repentance and without pretense, let's turn to Him just as we are. In His forgiving presence, let's declare total love for Jesus by surrendering all to Him. As a result, Jesus truly will become everything to us. Then we will be able to sing honestly about Jesus Christ and our love for Him.

As we make melody in our hearts to the Lord (Ephesians 5:19), let's worship in spirit and in truth.

The night should also be dedicated to the Lord in the event that He should require our service while others are sleeping. "By *honor*," that is, when we enjoy popularity. So we show ourselves to be true servants of God at such times? "By *dishonor*" – when we are disliked, when people slander us and seek to damage our reputation. Do men find us also under these experiences to be such as are humble and willing to suffer?

Paul declared: "I do all things for the sake of the Gospel" (I Cor. 9:23).

Read Revelation 3-5

The church in Sardis had no Nicolaitanes, no Balaam, and no Jezebel. They could boast that there were no false teachers, nor was false doctrine being taught; but there was an equally serious evil. What a fearful revelation when the King who knows all things announces: *I know your works, that you have a name* (reputation) *to be alive, but you are dead. Be watchful, and strengthen what still remains and is ready to die: for I have not found your works perfect before God. Remember therefore how you have received and heard, and hold fast, and repent* (Revelation 3:1-3). The world could endure the church in Sardis because it had "lost it purpose for existing" – just as a branch separated from the vine, it *could bear no fruit* (John 15:1-10). Thankfully there were *a few names even in Sardis who have not defiled their garments; and they shall walk with Me in white: for they are worthy. He that overcomes, the same shall be clothed in white raiment; and I will not blot out his name out of the Book of Life* (Revelation 3:4-5).

Although the Christians in Philadelphia had little strength, Jesus commended them for their faithfulness, saying: You have kept My Word, and have not denied My Name (3:8). The Lord assured them: Because you have kept the Word of My patience, I also will keep you from the hour of temptation, which shall come upon all the world (3:10).

The church members in Laodicea probably congratulated themselves on being moderate and broad-minded. They could pity the zealous Christians in other churches who provoked the anger of the world and the worshipers of false gods. The Laodicean believers could also pride themselves on their ability to compromise and make friends with those who hated Christ. But Jesus condemned this church for being *neither cold nor hot....because you are lukewarm, and neither cold nor hot, I will spew you out of My mouth......You say, I am rich....and have need of nothing; and know not that you are wretched, and miserable, and poor, and blind!* (3:15-17)

Our Lord appealed to them to buy of Him gold tried in the fire. ...Be zealous therefore, and repent (3:18-19), which means pay the price for true faith which is much more precious than gold that perishes, though it be tried with fire (I Peter 1:7), and pay the price for white raiment, to clothe your shame (Revelation 3:18).

Popularity, power, and material wealth can give a false perception of success and the blessing of the Lord. Compromise is self-deceiving and self-destructive. It distorts one's understanding of right and wrong.

Christ was not in the midst of this satisfied Laodicean church, but outside, standing at the door, knocking (3:20). To shut out Christ is to shut out the Captain of our salvation, the only Intercessor between God and Man, the Lord of our lives, and the Head of His Church.

Our Lord rebukes His people when we stray, and calls us to repent. Such rebukes are signs of His love. We have the promise that those who endure the testing and repent will receive promised rewards in eternity.

The King of kings is still knocking on doors of men's hearts with the invitation: To him that overcomes, I will grant to sit with Me on My throne, even as I also overcame and am sat down with My Father on His throne (Revelation 3:21).

But godliness with contentment is great gain

1 Timothy 6:6

The stress of economic difficulty darkens many a home. I am not now thinking of the fact that many people are poor and live in very modest circumstances. That in itself need not darken their homes. But I am thinking of this, that many parents do not have the courage to tell their children that they are poor. The children have therefore no idea of how meager the resources of the home are. And when they see how well their companions are dressed and what expensive amusements they indulge in, they demand the same.

Then many parents do one of two things:

Either they refuse to give their children these things, but do not dare to give the real reasons for doing so - at which the children become irritated and feel that father and mother are doing them an injustice.

Or they give their children these things, though they know that they cannot afford to do so. They would not have their children inferior to their companions.

The family debt mounts, and the unhappiness of both the parents and the home increases. This is, no doubt, the situation in more homes than we suspect.

How entirely different it would be if parents would acquaint their children with their economic situation! Let your children know how much you have to live on for the month or for the year. Figure out for them how much there will be for clothes and how much for amusements.

Yes, some say, but is it not too early to darken the lives of our children with economic worries at their age?

Try, and you will see! You will not deprive them of any of their joys. On the contrary, you will be giving them something very valuable: *a sense of responsibility*. And with a new *joy*, the joy of helping father and mother make both ends meet.

You will also be giving them something more valuable than amusements and fine clothes. You will be helping them toward contentment. And those who receive a legacy of this kind begin life with a wealth of riches.

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Concerning The End

Father, I will that they also whom thou has given me may be with me where I am; that they may behold my glory. (John 17:24)

Ought we talk to young people, those who are just beginning their journey, and are yet in life's springtime, about the end? May it not mar their happiness? Yet it is only the simple fact which the Psalmist declares, "Our life is soon cut off, and we fly away." And, too, we may raise the question whether the thought of death necessarily does mar our joy in life or our relish for work. That may be true of those who are altogether of the world. Death does end all – at any rate it ends all that they understand life to be. These have good reason, indeed, to dismiss thoughts of death and eternity. But is such a course wise? The writer just quoted also says (Ps. 90:12) "Lord, so teach us to number our days that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom."

But we have already learned, that in the case of our Savior the thought of death not only did not mar his joy in his life's work, but on the contrary aroused him to greater diligence in "redeeming the time." Just as little did it affect his enthusiasm for life itself. Hear in that wonderful high-priestly prayer in John 17, uttered when he stood face to face with death, the clear note of triumph and glorious assurance. And how many of his disciples, with their end in full view, have remained strong and joyful, under circumstances which would have left the worldling without even the semblance of gladness and courage. Even so shall it be in your case, if you will prove yourselves disciples indeed of Jesus Christ; for the Master's prayer will be heard in your behalf, "Father, I will that they also whom thou has given me may be with me where I am; that they may behold my glory."

Let it ever be true of you, "In the world, but not of the world," and of you, living or dying, it shall be said: "All's well that ends well."

To this end may our heavenly Father renew and increase in you the gift of his Holy Spirit, to strengthen you in faith, to enable you to live according to godliness, to give you patience in suffering, and to keep you in the sure hope of everlasting life!

Read Matthew 1-4

Mary of Nazareth was betrothed to Joseph, who was also from Nazareth and a descendant of King David (Matthew 1:18). It was the Jewish custom that the betrothal lasted for one year although it was not physically consummated until after the actual wedding took place. However, the Jews considered the betrothal as legally binding as marriage and required a divorce to dissolve it (Deuteronomy 22:13-30; 24:1-5). This explains why the angel told Joseph to *take unto you Mary your wife* (Matthew 1:20).

The birth of Jesus Christ took place this way: When His mother Mary was espoused (betrothed) to Joseph, before they came together, she was found with child (pregnant) of the Holy Spirit (1:18). When Joseph learned that Mary was with child by a miraculous act of God, he found this hard to accept and considered breaking off the engagement privately. But while he thought on these things, behold, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream, saying, Joseph, son of David, fear not to take to yourself Mary your wife; for that which is conceived in her is of the Holy Spirit. And she shall bring forth a Son, and you shall call His Name Jesus: for He shall save His people from their sins. Now all this was done, that it might be fulfilled which was spoken of the Lord by the prophet, saying, behold, the virgin shall be with Child, and shall bring forth a Son, and they shall call His Name Immanuel, which being interpreted is, God with us (1:19-23).

Prophecy foretold that the Messiah would belong to the royal house of David. Both Mary and Joseph were descendants of David. However, if Joseph had been the biological father of Jesus, He would have been born with the Adamic sin nature which is passed on to the children through the father. This would have made Jesus a sinner, like all mankind, and thus unable to save us from our sins. Furthermore, He would not have had a right to the throne of David, because Joseph was a descendant of King Jeconiah, those descendants God had disqualified from ruling as Messiah (Jeremiah 22:24-30; also II Kings 24:8-15; II Chronicles 36:8-10). Mary was also a descendant of King David, not through Solomon and Jeconiah, but through Nathan, another of David's sons (Luke 3:31; II Samuel 5:13-14).

The miracle of the conception of Jesus had been revealed by the prophet Isaiah 700 years before the event, when he foretold: *The virgin shall conceive, and bear a Son, and shall call His Name Immanuel* (God with us)...*the government shall be upon His shoulder; and His Name shall be called Wonderful, Counselor, The Mighty God, The Everlasting Father, The Prince of Peace* (Isaiah 7:14; 9:6). The prophet Isaiah spoke of "the one" virgin in the history of mankind who would conceive miraculously by the Holy Spirit. This resulted in the birth of "the One" who is (Matthew 1:23). The (Holy Spirit through - Editor) Apostle John confirmed this when he wrote: The Word (Christ) was made flesh, and dwelt among us, (and we beheld His glory, the glory as of the only begotten of the Father,) full of grace and truth (John 1:14).

Our Lord and Savior was born by miraculous conception in the likeness of sinful flesh (Romans 8:3), but without the inheritance of the Adamic sin nature. Our Creator took on our physical nature in a miraculous union of the human and the Eternal One, so that we might be redeemed from sin and created spiritually new in the image of God.

Christianity started with a miracle, the Babe of Bethlehem, who was both the Son of God and the Son of Mary. Likewise, a miracle takes place in the lives of all who *receive Him, to them He gave the power to become the sons of God, even to them that believe on His Name: who are born not of the will of the flesh, nor of the will of man, but of God* (John 1:12-13).

An Arresting Phrase Luke 3:23 - 38

You may have heard of the man who had been reading the phone book. When asked what he thought of it, he replied, "Well, it has a large cast of characters, but there's not much of a plot." Perhaps that is your sentiment when reading the genealogical records of the Old and New Testaments. You know what it is like when you come to them – you heave a sigh, your eyes glaze over, you start to wade through them and finally give up and move on, wondering to yourself what earthly good there could be in including such a list of names in the first place! This is exactly what too many Bible readers do – they either skip over such a list of names or read them quickly so as to move on. Yet it is important to pause and see their importance.

Unlike Matthew who provided a genealogy from Abraham (Matt. 1:1-17), Luke includes a genealogy that reaches back to the beginning of human history – to Adam (v. 38). The point is that Jesus is not only the fulfillment of the promises to Abraham (v. 34) and to David (v. 31) but also the embodiment of perfect humanity. Jesus Christ is very God and very man - two whole and perfect natures joined together into one person. Thus, an arresting phrase, referring to our Lord, is employed by Luke in verse 23 - "And Jesus Himself." Why add the word himself? It would have been simple enough to say, "Jesus began to be about thirty years of age." Instead, Luke emphasized the personality that he had already described through the first three chapters – "the man Christ Jesus" (I Tim. 2:5). Mary was instructed to "call His name JESUS" (1:31), and Luke reveals this "Jesus Himself" - and none other, as His genealogy confirms. JED

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Middle of the Roaders!

On that account, the middle-of-the-road man is a greater menace to the Faith than is the liberal.

Believers can meet the liberal in the intellectual forum and come out worse in a debate, but that fact avails little, since the victory and the argument are wrested by the popular vote. That is why the middle-of-the road man menaces the very life of the Lord's churches.

SELF-ESTEEM

"Let nothing be done through strife or vainglory; but in lowliness of mind let each esteem other better than themselves." Philippians 2:3.

There is a great emphasis these days, even among Christians, on developing a positive self-image, building up one's self-esteem, and seeking self-fulfillment. The emphasis is on one's own self. But God's Word teaches differently.

One famous television pastor even developed his own unbiblical definition of sin: "Sin is any act or thought that robs myself or another human being of his or her self-esteem." Then he even redefined being born again as being "changed from a negative to a positive self-image."

Such concepts are diametrically opposed to Scripture, though often cloaked in pseudo-biblical garb, and they are leading multitudes away from the true gospel and true Christian life. We do not need a positive self-image. In reality, we need a realistic self-image – to see ourselves as God sees us. Paul warned: *"For I say, through the grace given unto me, to every man that is among you, not to think of himself more highly than he ought to think; but to think soberly, according as God hath dealt to ever man the measure of faith."* (Romans 12:3)

Paul served Christ faithfully for 30 years, yet still esteemed himself as chief of sinners (I Timothy 1:15), and testified that it was only "by the grace of God I am what I am" (1 Corinthians 15:10). Jesus said: "If any man will come after me, let him deny himself (Luke 9:23). "God hath chosen the foolish things of the world to confound the wise; and God hath chosen the weak things of the world to confound the things which are mighty; And base things of the world, and things which are despised, hath God chosen, yea, and things which are not, to bring to nought things that are: "That no flesh should glory in his presence." (1 Corinthians 1:27-29)
