The Voice In The Wilderness

Luke 3:1-6

ohn the Baptist is here declared to be the forerunner of Christ, the herald who bears the important tidings of the coming King.

The time of this unprecedented event is very carefully described. It is a historical fact. The secular rulers in power are mentioned first, and then the ecclesiastical rulers.

By merely mentioning such names as Caesar, Phillip, Tiberius, Pontius Pilate, Herod and his brother, Annas and Caiaphas we are brought face to face with a succession of the most appalling wicked and perverse acts in the world. One historian describes Tiberius like this: "He was talented, ambitious, cruel, licentious, infamous and inhuman."

The State as well as the Church was in a very degenerate and deplorable condition. It was, without question, a most corrupt and evil age. It appeared as though the Prince of Darkness dictated and ruled without interference.

About 400 years had passed since a prophet from God had spoken. There had been a long and dismal intermission without a message from the living God. Malachi was the last prophet through whom the voice of God was heard.

But at the appointed hour God broke the silence. Perhaps the old saints which had been waiting for the consolation of Israel commenced to wonder and question: "Has God forgotten about His promises? Is He not going to send us a Saviour after all?"

But all of a sudden God spoke and we read: "*The word* of God came unto John the son of Zacharias in the wilderness." The word of God passed by the emperor, passed by the governor, passed by the tetrarch, passed the high priests, and lighted upon a man, called and prepared by God in the wilderness.

God works in a mysterious ways, His wonders to perform.

Where could the Word of God find a receptive place in a time like this? Not in Rome. We would hardly expect that. Not in Jerusalem. We might have expected it there, but no –

So it went outside everything to a wilderness which symbolically pictures the world's spiritual and moral condition of the time. There in that wilderness the Word of God found vantage ground in a man who had been in the wilderness ten years alone with God. A man who was clothed in raiment of camel's hair with a leather girdle about his loins; and his meat was locust and wild honey, and he was filled with the Holy Spirit of God from before he was born.

Almost 2,000 years have gone; and now we know that the most important event in the history of the world happened when the Word of God came to this one man.

After the Word of God came to him, he came with the Word to the people. It was a word of repentance and remission of sin. He should prepare the way for the Lord, so he preached about sin. Christ and Christmas means nothing to us unless we see we are sinners and in need of a Saviour.

John was sent to prepare the people for the Lord's coming. Their hearts had to be prepared. Every valley shall be filled, and every mountain and hill shall be brought low." In this figurative speech the valley represents the humble and contrite heart, while the mountains and hills stand for the proud and self-righteous.

The forerunner of Christ had in one hand the sharp axe, the law; that brought down the high and lofty, and in the other hand he had the gospel, which lifted up the poor in spirit. They could not exalt themselves, but the gospel lifted them up with its good news of forgiveness.

Morning Glory

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Through John's preaching the mountains and hills were brought down, the valleys were lifted, the crooked places were made straight and the rough ways smooth. It was leveled so all flesh should see the salvation of God. They should see that they were all sinners and lost in the first Adam, and all could be saved through repentance and faith in the last Adam – Jesus Christ.

People from all walks of life swarmed out to hear this wilderness preacher. The crowds in the synagogue and the temple seemed to diminish quite rapidly, and the religious leaders became disturbed. They finally sent a delegation to John and asked, "Who are you? Are you Christ?" "No." Are you Elias?" "No." What are you then, so we can give those who sent us an answer."

"Ah, I am just the voice of one crying in the wilderness." What a humble answer.

Say, friends, have you ever had a wilderness experience? When you were brought face to face with God and your sin?

Martin Luther had such an experience over there in Rome when he climbed the steps of the Monastery. It was then and there God's word of liberation came to him. He had been trying to work his way, but then it dawned upon him that "the just shall live by faith. The gospel of free grace came to him, and through him it came to the churches and the people.

The 5^{th} of April, 1796 a farmer boy in Norway by the name of Hans Nielson Hauge had an extraordinary wilderness experience. It happened while he was walking behind his plow, humming on a familiar tune. The hymn is Number 315 in Concordia: "Jesus, for Thee and Thy blessed communion – Longing

possesses my heart and my mind." God's Word came to him through the verses of this hymn. When he had finished the second verse he couldn't get any further. He was so gripped by the presence of God and the glorious communion with his Savior that his face was literally transformed. "Oh my God! Oh my God!" he said as he folded his hands against his bosom. He could not work anymore. He unhitched his horse and went up to his room. There he pleaded with God to have mercy on his people. In answer to his prayer he heard the voice of God saying: "Whom shall I send?" He whispered, "Lord, send me." As he said this he became so concerned for lost souls that he felt he could die if he could only win one.

Before the year had ended everyone in his home was seeking the Lord, and as the years passed this word which came to him while he was plowing resounded throughout the whole land of Norway. God's Word came to him, and he in turn came with the Word to the entire country.

What we need more than anything else today is a new wilderness experience. Many pastors today have no message because they lack a wilderness experience where they have been alone with God. We need fearless, God-called and God-sent witnesses. Dr. Ole Hallesby said when he was in this country in 1923 that the pastors were the greatest hindrance for revival in the Lutheran churches in America. Many pastors come out from seminaries as dead as if they came out of the cemeteries. The only hope for the Lutheran church in America is an old-fashioned revival starting with the pastors. How many are praying for that?

Questions – Answered

Is it wrong to identify individuals by name when exposing error?

You say you think it is unkind, unloving and unchristian to mention names of individuals or organizations, even though they may be teaching error. And in your opinion, it does more harm than good.

Our behavior as Christians should not be governed by what we think but by the Word of God. Let me share with you several instances from the Bible where individuals were identified by name.

"I wrote unto the church: but Diotrephes, who loveth to

have the preeminence among them, receiveth us not. Wherefore, if I come, I will remember his deeds which he doeth, prating against us with malicious words: and not content therewith, neither doth he himself receive the brethren, and forbiddeth them that would, and casteth them out of the church." III John 9, 10. Here the apostle John identifies Diotrephes by name and tells what he did that was wrong.

"But when I saw that they walked not uprightly according to the truth of the gospel, I said unto Peter before them all. If thou, being a Jew, livest after the manner of Gentiles, and not as do the Jews, why compellest thou the Gentiles to live as do the Jews?" Gal. 2:14.

In Galatia, Paul rebuked even Peter publicly and by name. The reason for this is explained in verse 12.

"For before that certain came from James, he did eat with the Gentiles: but when they were come, he withdrew and separated himself, fearing them which were of the circumcision."

When Peter was with the Gentiles, he ate with them and lived after the manner of the Gentiles. Then, for fear of some Jews from Jerusalem who were visiting the church, he compelled other Gentiles to live like the Jews.

Pau went on to explain in verses 15 and 16 that justification was by faith and not by keeping the law. <u>Peter was not to</u> <u>change his message because the crowd changed.</u> Later, in II Peter 3:15, even though Paul had rebuked him publicly and by name, Peter referred to Paul as "our beloved brother Paul."

"Alexander the coppersmith did me much evil: the Lord reward him according to his works." II Tim. 4:14. Paul identifies Alexander the coppersmith by name. Earlier in this same chapter, in verse 10, he identifies Demas by name: "For Demas hath forsaken me, having loved this present world ..."

Other examples could be given, but these are sufficient to show that it is not wrong to identify individuals by name when dealing with unscriptural and unwise practices and teaching.

The danger of not doing so is clearly illustrated in the case at Galatia: "And the other Jews dissembled likewise with him; insomuch that Barnabas also was carried away with their dissimulation." Gal. 2:13.

Influential leaders who preach, promote and practice unscriptural philosophies will be followed by unsuspecting younger Christians by virtue of the fact that they are so influential. Peter's influence affected even Barnabas who had been Paul's mentor previously.

If Dr. ... had not named individuals in the ..., I would have been led to yoke up with unbelievers because of the respect I had for some preachers who were leading into such an unscriptural yoke.

No Old Testament prophet had as much to say about the Messiah Christ as Isaiah. Here, in addition to prophesying the nature of Christ's birth, Isaiah gives us the very nature of Christ by giving us a name for Him – Immanuel. In ancient Israel, names were not chosen or assigned randomly, they were filled with meaning. That fact is clearly evident here. The name Immanuel means "God with us," and that name of Christ was recaptured in the events leading up to Jesus' birth in Matthew 1:23. By giving Jesus the title Immanuel, God was also giving us a definition of His identity. Distinct from the millions of babies born throughout the centuries, this baby was more – He was God in human flesh. – Bill Crowder

Editor's Note: "And she will bring forth a Son, and you shall call His name Jesus, for He will save His people from their sins." JESUS is His personal name; many people talk about GOD, but relatively <u>few talk about Jesus.</u>

In comparison, that is because it becomes much more personal! "A good name is to be chosen rather than great riches, Loving favor rather than silver and gold." Proverbs 22:1. Revelation 3:12.

Angels and the Christmas Story:

Part One

Who Are Angels?

If you were to ask me that question in the context of everyday life, my knee-jerk response would probably be, "They are my favorite baseball team, and they play in Anaheim, California. And, by the way, they won the 2002 World Series over the San Francisco Giants." Unfortunately, much of the current cultural thinking about who angels are and what they do is no more biblically accurate than that. From paintings to poems to movies to television shows, it seems that angels need a new press agent They just aren't being well represented. Of course, it helps to remember that their best and most accurate representation comes to us in the pages of the Bible.

Angels are seen throughout the Scriptures and are called by a variety of names, including cherubim, seraphim, and living creatures. Sometimes they are described as men, often in shining garments. They are seen guarding Eden, waging war rescuing Peter from prison, worshiping in the presence of God, and tragically, in the case of some angels, rebelling against God. They carry names like Michael ("who is like God"or, Gabriel ("warrior of God"), and Lucifer ("light-bearer," before he became Satan – the Adversary). They are the often mysterious, sometimes mercurial servants of God that are at the center of many of His dealings with men and women in the Bible.

While angels unquestionably do more than simply carry messages, it's impossible to underestimate their critical role as messengers bringing announcements from heaven to earth. This may be why the New Testament word for "preaching the gospel" (announcing God's message to people) is *euangelizo*, which comes from the same word as "angel." The gospel (good news) was first delivered to the world by angelic messengers during the events surrounding the birth of the Savior.

It's impossible to underestimate the angels' critical role as messengers bringing announcements from heaven to earth.

The first angel we encounter in the Christmas story is Gabriel, an archangel – apparently the highest ranking in the command structure of the angelic realm. Gabriel visited planet Earth to inform the principal players, and, ultimately, the world that *the "fullness of the time"* had come – that long-awaited moment in history when the promised Messiah would arrive (Gal. 4:4). ...

STILL WATERS

(Continued from last issue of the Morning Glory)

"He leadeth me beside still waters." In the Orient the shepherd always leads his sheep. Our Shepherd is so abundantly able to lead, for He knows our need. Our need is interpreted by His own experience. He was here on earth as a Man. He was tempted in all points like as we are. He may not lead us to the waters immediately; that is, as soon as we are conscious of thirst, but the One Who said on the Cross,

"I thirst," will certainly see to it that the thirst of His sheep is quenched. The trouble with some sheep is that they do not follow His leading, hence trouble comes. "For this cause many are weak and sickly among you."

"Beside still waters" might better be expressed <u>"unto</u> <u>still waters."</u> It is not a picture of a shepherd leading his sheep along a quietly flowing stream, but of leading them to a fountain or a well where they may drink. These drinking places abound in Palestine (Israel). At one of them Jacob met Rachel. At one of them Eleazar met Rebecca. At one of them Moses met the daughters of Midian.

We come to drink at a spiritual fountain. Man[kind] does have heart thirsts. The human heart thirsts for love, and we read of the love of the Spirit. The human heart thirsts for fellowship, and we read of the communion and fellowship of the Holy Ghost. Indeed, our heart thirst can be satisfied through Him.

These waters are still waters, or waters of quietness. They are so called because the Holy Spirit loves peace and brings quietness and rest to the human heart.

Water is symbolical of the Holy Spirit, as we have seen. Paul says, "We have been all made to drink into one Spirit; " that is, at the one spiritual fountain. This drinking is referred to in Ephesians 5:18, "Be not drunk with wine ... But be filled with the Spirit." In other words, we are not to drink wine; we are to drink water. The Holy Spirit will do for us spiritually all that water does for us physically. Water cleanses; the Spirit Who indwells us is holy. The thought here is of drinking, however, by which fullness and satisfaction come to us. We are to be filled with the Spirit. To be filled with the Spirit will mean that we are filled with life. Water fertilizes. It makes the desert to blossom like a rose. It brings life in waste places. It is the law of the spirit of life in Christ Jesus that make us free from the law of sin and death. How God's sheep need fullness of life! What is it that enables the oak to spread its branches and stand against the storm? Life! What is it that enables the oak to throw off its old dead leaves in the springtime? Life! What is it that enables the fruit tree to bear refreshing fruit to bless men? Life! What is it that

enables flowers to bloom and beautify the earth, and perfume the air, and give delight to men? Life! What is it that enables the bird to wing its way above the storm into the clear sunlight of heaven and to sing its sweet song? Life! The Spirit is the Spirit of Life. Through Him we are able to stand against the storms that rage through the earth. Through Him we are able to cast off the evil habits of an old sinful nature. Through Him we produce the fruit of the Spirit that refreshes both God and men. Through Him we are able to manifest the "beauty of Jesus" to others and live lives that are fragrant to God. Through Him we are able to sing and make melody in our hearts unto the Lord above the storm.

In closing we emphasize the personal pronoun ME. This is a personal matter. The Psalm means you – God's well-loved sheep.

The "maketh" of compassionate constraint, and the "leadeth" of gentle guidance refer to you. How we do nod that "maketh" and that "leadeth"!

A baby is just learning to walk. He toddles across the room. Mother is standing by, and stretches out a hand to help the baby to learn to walk, but the boy turns his head, ignores her hand, toddles on, totters, falls and gets hurt. Meanwhile the mother smiles at the toddling boy who has refused her hand and says, "He thinks he can do without me." We are like that so many times. We think we can do it without Him, but His word is, "*Apart from Me ye can do nothing*." We cannot grow and thrive and walk in a way that is well pleasing to God unless "*He maketh me to lie down in green pastures; He leadeth me beside the still waters.*"

"Yes, the Lord is my Shepherd, and I am His sheep Oh, the thought fills my soul with delight, For we pasture together by still waters deep, And we shelter together at night."

The Bible and Our Founding Fathers

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READ PSALMS 46 - 51

Who would have believed that David – the man after the heart of God, who wrote: "Blessed is the man that walks not in the counsel of the ungodly, … But his delight is in the Law of the LORD; and in His Law he meditates day and night (Psalm 1:1-2) – would one day need to write so deep in a cry of sorrow and repentance as: Have mercy upon me, O God, according to Your loving-kindness; according to the multitude of Your tender mercies....acknowledge my transgressions (51:1-3).

The cause for his cry for mercy happened in the midst of David's success when he could relax at home and let others fight his wars. It was then that he selfishly gave way to lust and committed adultery with Bathsheba. She was the beautiful wife of his neighbor, Uriah the Hittite, one of his most loyal soldiers. Through a military maneuver initiated by David, Uriah was killed, allowing David to legally marry Bathsheba. It appeared to be a happy ending for David and Bathsheba until their infant son became ill and Nathan, the fearless prophet of God, appeared to denounce the king's selfish, wicked sins and to prophesy the child's death (II Samuel 12:14).

If any of the surrounding heathen kings had done what David did, no further thought would have been given to the matter, since kings ruled supreme and answered to no one. But David was chosen to rule the people of God under His Law and the Law did not permit a blood sacrifice for adultery or murder. Instead, the guilty party was sentenced to death (Leviticus 20:10). David deserved to die and he knew it. He cast himself on the mercy of God, not claiming clemency as an important king, but as a brokenhearted sinner, pleading: "Blot out my transgressions" (Psalm 51:1). He had also planned the death of Uriah, so he also prayed: Deliver me from blood-guiltiness (51:14).

We wish that this horrible blight upon David's life would not have happened; yet, it reveals to every sinner who truly repents that he can experience the mercy and forgiving love of God. But, it also teaches the inescapable consequences of sin. As a result of these sins, David reaped untold sorrow during the remaining twenty years of his reign, just as the prophet Nathan had foretold: *The sword shall never depart from your house; because you have despised Me.....Behold, I will raise up evil against you out of your own house* (II Samuel 12:9-11). No child of God can look upon sin as an unimportant mistake – "I'll just confess it and God will forgive it." To willfully sin is to <u>despise the commandment of the LORD</u> (12:9) and His authority; it is choosing to cooperate with Satan, the enemy of God.

The first step in repentance is the recognition of the awfulness of sin, for godly sorrow works repentance (II Corinthians 7:10). Repentance leads in confession, as David prayed: I acknowledge my transgressions; my sin is ever before me (Psalms 51:3). Since the source of all sin is selfishness (Ed. prIde), David continued: Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me. Cast me not away from Your presence and take not Your Holy Spirit from me (51:10-11). To be cast away from the presence of God is to be cast out of His covenant (Genesis 4:14, 11, Genesis 13:23).

David's repentance was essential to fulfill the next portion of his prayer; *Restore unto me the joy of Your salvation;* and with his restoration came a renewed desire: **Then will I teach transgressors Your ways, and sinners shall be converted to You** (Psalm 51:12-13).

Strong In Battle

The other enemy with which the Christian must reckon is the spiritual hosts of wickedness in the heavenly places. The enemy is not only here on earth and visible to us; he is about us in the air, invisible.

In Daniel 10 we are told that Daniel was in mourning for three whole weeks. From other expressions in the book we are led to understand that he prayed a good deal during this time. There was s special burden upon his heart concerning which he had to speak with the Lord; verses 12 and 13 leads us to believe that. There it is written: *Then said he unto me, Fear not, Daniel; for from the first day that thou didst set thy heart to understand, and to humble thyself before thy God, thy words were heard: and* I am come for thy words' sake. But the prince of the kingdom of Persia withstood me one and twenty days; but, lo, Michael, one of the chief princes, came to help me."

Daniel's prayer was heard in heaven from the first day that he called upon the Lord, but it took twenty-one days for the answer to reach him; the powers of the air prevented the messenger from getting through to Daniel. We are told that this power was the prince of Persia. If help was to reach Daniel, God's messenger had to be given assistance in breaking through the spiritual hosts that opposed him. So Michael, one of the chief princes – the guardian of Israel, was sent to assist the messenger so that he could reach Daniel. After this the messenger was to have a new encounter with the prince of Persia, and was also to meet the prince of Greece; again he was to be assisted by Michael.

If we turn to the Book of Revelation we shall find that the same powers are fighting each other. And there was war in heaven; Michael and his angels going forth to war with the dragon; and the dragon warred and his angels going forth to war with the dragon; and the dragon warred and his angels; and they prevailed not, neither was their place found any more in heaven. And the great dragon was cast down, the old serpent, he that is called the Devil and Satan, the deceiver of the whole world; he was cast down to the earth, and his angels were cast down with him." (Rev. 12:7-9).

These remarkable powers in the air seem to have two methods of carrying out their warfare. The first is to prevent help from God to reach us. It is a kind of spiritual blockade that is applied against the Christians in order to starve them into submission. The other method is one of direct attack.

Did you ever see a river that was as straight as an arrow? Probably not. They generally wind back and forth from the time they gush out of a mountain spring or seep out of a lake until they find repose in the bosom of the great deep.

And why is it that the river is never straight?

Let a master of the epigram answer and at the same time drive home a wholesome truth: "A river becomes crooked by following the line of least resistance. So does a man!"

The Log of the Good Ship Grace

Daniel and John show us this battle as it is fought between the hosts of God on the one side and the hosts of wickedness in the air on the other. Paul shows us these same evil powers at war against God's people.

Such clear passages should convince us that the doctrine concerning the evil powers which oppose God's people is not empty talk. Furthermore, we ought to remember that Satan is not only fighting against individual Christians, nor even against the whole Christian Church; he is seeking to conquer the nations and to make them subservient to himself. It is Satan himself who is chief of the spiritual hosts of wickedness in the air. ...

Our great comfort and hope for the future is that this evil power shall one day be broken. Satan shall not only fall from heaven; he is to fall out of every man's heart and out of the world; he is to go down into the bottomless pit, down into the lake that burns with fire and brimstone, down into the place prepared for the devil and his angels. There he shall be imprisoned through all eternity. This comfort gives every Christian courage to continue the battle. ...

Onward then ye people, Join our happy throng, Blend with ours your voices In the triumph song; Glory, laud, and honor Unto Christ the King; This through countless ages Men and angels sing.

The Mountain Shall Be Made A Plain

Fundamental, God-honoring believers and ministries face formidable obstacles today - mountains when compared to their native lack of strength or ability to overcome the barriers they face. Back in the prophet Zechariah's day, the Jewish remnant who returned from the Babylonian captivity had a difficult job to do - they needed to rebuild the temple so God's people could once again worship and serve their God aright. But just as they set out to obey God's revealed will, Satan placed hindrances in their way and did whatever he could to oppose, discourage and sidetrack the despised, yet faithful, remnant. But God did not leave them to their own devices, for He gave a vision to the prophet Zechariah in which He promised to provide His people with the divine grace needed to face every foe: "Who art thou, O great mountain? Before Zerubbabel (the remnant's commander) thou shalt become a plain" (Zech. 4:7). The vision of Zechariah (Zech. 4) reveals the way in which God enabled His people to do a mighty work in a difficult day. And, by the way, those same principles apply to the servant of the Lord in the Church Age as well.

What are some of the "mountains" that true servants of God face today? First, they face opposition from even those who claim to be Christians. You can be assured that the believer who takes a forthright stand against compromise and apostasy will be opposed by the "Christian" majority who pursue "unity in diversity" at the expense of purity in doctrine and practice, who espouse accommodation of error to the total neglect of Biblical separation from the same and who value liberal-mindedness as a virtue while decrying the fundamentalist Christian who claims to have the whole truth and nothing but the truth. Well, the Fundamentalist does have the whole truth, for the inspired, inerrant Word of God is the source of "all truth" (Jn. 16:12-15; Eph. 2:19-3:5). The Bible defines the one way of salvation through Jesus Christ and describes how believers are to walk and minister in the only way that is acceptable and pleasing to Him.

Another "mountain" is the reality that we simply do not have the abilities, the resources or the organizational machinery to impact the world, let alone our own communities, for Christ. We, like the Jews in Zechariah's day who returned to Jerusalem to rebuild the temple, lack so much <u>in and of ourselves!</u> The influential, powerful religious movements of our day seem to have the numbers, finances and plans to captivate the multitudes, but such is never true for the fundamentalist remnant. However, as we shall see, it is the faithful remnant whom God delights to use for His glory and to do His work in the world today.

Let us consider Zechariah 4 to see what was aforetime "*written for our learning*" (Rom. 15:4). God showed the prophet a golden candlestick with a bowl above and seven pipes supplying oil to the seven lamps beneath. The light from the candlestick was undoubtedly radiant due to the abundant oil serving as fuel (vv. 1-3). A Godly testimony will shine brightly and boldly, reflecting the true Light in this dark, sin-cursed world (Jn. 1:1-12). We must never lose sight of our purpose: to be *light in the Lord:* (to) *walk as children of light ... and* (to) *have no fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness*" (Eph. 5:8-11).

The Lord singled out Zerubbabel, the one chosen to lead the returned remnant in the rebuilding of the temple in Jerusalem, as the primary person needing to understand the substance of Zechariah's vision. Zerubbabel still needed a full measure of God's strength and provision to accomplish his task. What was to be his source of strength? "Not by might, nor by power, but by My Spirit, saith the LORD of hosts" (v. 6). What a tremendous truth! Whatever the Lord calls us to do, the mighty power of His indwelling Holy Spirit will help us to accomplish that task. No obstacle can deter the believer thus endued with the power of the Holy Spirit - the "mountain ... Shall become a plain" (v. 7). God's enabling grace will be our strength and comfort when others mock or sneer. We must stand upon this blessed truth as we simply endeavor to be faithful to the work to which God had called us. Be a bright, shining testimony for the Lord and remember that His Spirit will empower us to do His will.

Imagine the discouragement the remnant must have felt when scorned by the enemy. This resistance even caused them to delay the work for a number of years. No doubt they were reminded time and again of how their efforts were seemingly insignificant. But the word of the Lord again clearly revealed that what God had begun by the hand of Zerubbabel, He would also bring to completion by the authority of *"the LORD of hosts"* (vv, 8-9). Yes, many of Zerubbabel's enemies despised what they considered to be a "<u>small thing</u>" (v. 10), but once the joy was completed, all would certainly recognize that this was truly a work of the Almighty God. Faithfulness is the Lord's criteria for success.

The plummet in the hand of Zerubbabel was to one day verify the straight and true perfection of the building. *"The eyes of the LORD"* (v. 10 cf. 3:9) are continually upon His work. Surely this speaks of the importance of seeing any true labor from God's perspective, no matter how small and insignificant it may appear in the world's eyes. God is the One *"with whom we have to do"* (Heb. 4:12-13). What He determines to be right and acceptable is the only standard that matters. Forget what the scorner sees as deficient and of no real consequence – his opinion is irrelevant. God is the One we are to strive to please.

Finally, the "*two olive branches*" refer to Joshua and Zerubbabel, the two olive-oil-rich, Spirit-filled instruments God used to perform His work (vv. 11-14). How greatly we, too, need to rely upon the indwelling Holy Spirit to enable us to do His will today. And remember, faithful service may not impress the "movers and shakers" in mainstream Christianity today but God's opinion is the only one that matters. Whatever mountain the devil places in our way to hinder our work for the Lord will be leveled by His almighty power. DWC

A young man, James Taylor, had lived a worldly life and was a leader in opposing a revival that had swept his neighborhood.

The morning of his wedding day he awoke with the words of Joshua 24:15 on his mind. In earlier years he had memorized that verse.

Unlike our modern customs, he put in a full day's work before his wedding that evening. As he went about his labors, the Holy Spirit convicted his heart, and he accepted Jesus as his Saviour. Then he said, "Yes, we will serve the Lord!"

At first his bride was dismayed by this decision but soon became a believer, and a Christian home was established.

You say, "What's so unusual about that story?"

Well, that young man was the great-grandfather of J. Hudson Taylor, founder of the China Inland Mission. Nor has the influence of that first decision been without present-day consequences. The general director of that organization is the great-grandson of the founder.

Though saving faith cannot be transmitted from parents to children, God does use the holy influence of fathers and mothers upon their offspring and upon successive generations.

What if James Taylor hadn't yielded to Christ? What if his decision had been different? It is possible that a company of dedicated missionaries would not have served in the Orient under an organization whose founding was a direct result of that man's conversion.

The 'watchmen' that we now hear about are few and often 'lonely' but are given the great task of bearing the people to God in prayer and forewarning.


