A Meeting With Jesus

(Read John 18:33-40)

"Jesus answered, My kingdom is not of this world; if my kingdom were of this world, then would my servants fight, that I should not be delivered to the Jews; but now my kingdom is not from hence. Pilate therefore said unto him, Art thou a king then? Jesus answered, Thou sayest that I am a king, to this end have I been born, and to this end am I come into the world, that I should bear witness unto the truth. Every one that is of the truth heareth my voice." John 18:36-37

ilate just had to meet Jesus. He would much rather not do so, but there was no way around. The moment finally came when he had to stand face to face with the Savior of the world and either condemn or release Him. This was undoubtedly the most serious event in the life of this Roman procurator.

Every person who has been instructed in the Word of God, and whom the Holy Spirit has thus touched, is bound to take sides for or against Christ. Like Pilate, many are not able to take a clear-cut stand for or against the Savior. They struggle along between two opposites, and find peace neither in the world nor with God.

These are the most miserable people on earth. In the company of sinners they feel God's judgment over them; yet they do not feel at home among Christians. They are at a loss either way. They neither go wholly over to Christ's side, nor do they dare to reject Him completely.

Why is it so difficult to take a stand for Christ? We believe Him to be good and that He has our welfare at heart; should it be so difficult to choose such a one? Yes, it is, when that good one is *Jesus*. Why precisely when it is He?

It is because His Kingdom is not of this world. He claims us for another world and a new life. He requires that we unite ourselves with Him alone. This is the last thing we earthbound human beings want to do.

Who would have failed to respond if Jesus had cried, "Come unto me all ye who desire money; I will give you as much as you want. Come all ye forgotten and neglected ones, and I will give you honor and power. Come ye who seek entertainment and amusement; this I will provide without money and without price."

There would have been a mad scramble to be first. People will stand in line long hours, sometimes all night, for an opportunity of being entertained for a couple of hours. But Jesus does not promise to give these things; consequently people conclude that there is no joy or satisfaction in His company.

Who can be more warped than a human being? Today we live, and tomorrow we may be gone; this world cannot offer us a shred of comfort in the hour of death. Yet we love this world so much that we dismiss Him who alone can sustain us as we pass through the valley of shadows.

A young lady had been moved mightily by the Spirit of God at church one Sunday evening. Upon reaching home, and still in great stress, she confided these things to her mother; she thereupon urged her daughter to give her heart to the Lord. But the girl had a date for a dance the following Sunday night, and promised that she would become a Christian after that date. At the dance a week later she fell in a swoon and was brought home in an unconscious condition. She regained consciousness just long enough to speak these despairing words, "Eight days too

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late." Thus she died.

Many have chosen as she did, because the Kingdom of Christ is not of this world. They have lost everything. Shall this be your fate? Shall your once precious life be lost?

Death may come to the cotter's hut,

Kings heed his behest; In vain we try to suit the door 'Gainst this unwelcome guest.

Jesus knocks in love so gently, Closed remains the door, Turning, He leaves you sadly Death will leave you nevermore.

What help has the world to offer you then, you who reject Christ?

One would think that since it is such a difficult thing to take a stand for Christ, it must be an easy matter to get rid of Him. Such is not the case, however. Every time we try to get away from Jesus we are disturbed as Pilate was; a voice within tells that it will prove to be our everlasting misfortune to get away from Christ. We can never quite rid ourselves of that thought. We know that it is best for us to continue as Christians. We know that if we leave Him we are headed for a lost eternity. So in spite of temptations to leave our Lord we are strongly constrained to remain with Him. We cannot quite get away from Him, nor rid ourselves of His presence.

It is true that it is a costly affair to follow Jesus. The path in His steps is not a smooth and easy one. But it is also true that it costs to depart from Jesus.

The longing soul cries out from its prison for Jesus. Even in the depths of his sin the sinner is compelled to listen to that plaintive cry from the soul. The sinner must face Jesus. The words that Paul heard on the Damascus road, "It is hard for thee to kick against the goads," meet many a person today also when he tries to get away from Jesus. The goad is lodged in the heart; every time we kick, the goad hurts us.

Why in your sins do you tarry, A stranger to God remain? The world doth deceive the unwary. Come to your Savior again.

Then no goad shall prod you; your peace shall be like a river, and your righteousness as the mighty waves of the sea.

Pilate's great mistake was that he counseled with the enemies of Jesus. Every time that he was at the point of releasing Jesus he sought their advice rather than to follow his own convictions. Three times he faced the Savior, was gripped by Him, and was ready to dismiss the charges against Him. But each time he conferred with Christ's enemies, and with each time his fear of man increased. Finally he compromised on his convictions.

The same thing happens today. Young people glance questioningly in the direction of their friends; the wife wonders if her husband will be pleased if she becomes a Christian; and the business man fears the disapproval of his business associates. Finally the desire to be saved yields to cowardice, and the fear of man treads with an iron heel upon the soul that longs for Jesus.

"Release unto us Barabbas!" This is the cry of the godless mob that wishes to live as it pleases. "We have a law, and according to that law He must die." This demand rises in the hearts of those who have been overpowered by sin and who seem to enjoy their liberty apart from God. "Release Jesus, and you are no longer the friend of Caesar." Thus was Pilate bound by the fear of man. By an irrevocable law this same thing happens to all who begin to walk upon this road.

There will come a time when you for the last time will face Jesus and have an opportunity to choose life. The next move will be His. He will judge you according to your works of refusing His salvation.

For Christ's sake and your own, depart from this dangerous path. Be warned by Pilate's example, and give Christ the power in your life. Place yourself on the side of your Savior, and heed not the taunts of the godless throng. Then He will deal with you in grace, and you shall find life eternal.

At Ease in Zion

"Woe to them that are at ease in Zion, and trust in the mountain of Samaria, which are named chief of the nations, to whom the house of Israel came! (Deuteronomy 33:26).

Zion (or Jerusalem) was the capital of Judah, the southern kingdom, and Samaria was the capital of the northern kingdom, Israel. Despite the ungodliness rampant in both nations, as well as suffering due to drought and other judgments sent by God, the leaders in Zion and Samaria were still living in decadent luxury, and most of the people were following their example. The rustic prophet Amos was thus called by God to pronounce coming judgment on both nations and especially on their leaders.

God's nature and God's principles do not change. "For I am the LORD, I change not" (Malachi 3:6). If God was angry with those of His ancient people who were living in affluent ease while indifferent to the sin in the nation and in their own lives, must this not be true also in modern "Christian" America? Have evangelical Christians today become "lovers of pleasures more than lovers of God" (2 Timothy 3:4)? One should at least raise the question when their churches become cathedrals and their homes become show places, when their music stirs their feelings but not their souls, when they spend more time in "rest and recreation" than with the Lord and His Word, and when they begin to allow "the care of this world, and the deceitfulness of riches (to) choke the word" so that they become "unfruitful" (Matthew 13:22).

God was longsuffering with Israel, but judgment finally came to them. Perhaps He has been calling to us in the earthquake and the hurricane, the drought and the flood, the famine and the pestilence, telling us that judgment is coming. Are we at ease in Zion, saying, "Soul, ...take thine ease, eat, drink, and be merry" (Luke 12:19)? If so, may God stir us to repentance and rededication! HMM

Read Revelation 6-8

The exile of John on Patmos, and the suffering taking place in Smyrna (Revelation 2:8-9), are examples of the persecution that was intensifying throughout the Roman Empire.

In today's reading, we are thrilled to view a great multitude which no one could number, from all nations ... These stood before the throne and before the Lamb, clothed with white robes, and palm (branches) in their *hands. They cried with a loud voice, saying,* (we owe our) *salvation to our God, who is seated upon the throne, and to the Lamb* (7:9-10). Eternal life is the point of focus for this white-robed, palm-bearing multitude, who overcame Satan, and are, at last, in the presence of their Lord. All who have experienced salvation through Jesus Christ will rejoice with the hosts in Heaven throughout eternity. This revelation was not only comforting, but strengthened the faith of first-century Christians who faced fierce opposition from a hostile world.

Each generation of believers discovers that the opposition is strong, the wicked numerous, and the deceptions so subtle that, in our human strength and wisdom, we would easily lose heart or be led astray. Down through the ages, those who have had their hearts set upon living for Jesus have always been a small minority. As Jesus foretold: *Narrow is the way that leads to life, and few are those who find it* (Matthew 7:14). However, as the heavens were opened on Patmos, we realize that the total population of Heaven will continue to increase until Jesus returns. These faithful Christians may not have had much of earth's pleasures, but now they are praising the Lord *with a loud voice ...Saying, Amen: Blessing, and glory, and wisdom, and thanksgiving, and honor, and power, and might, be unto our God for ever and ever. Amen* (Revelation 7:9-12).

<u>Glory</u> describes the splendor of His true nature. <u>Wis-dom</u> reveals the supremacy of His knowledge which is available to us through His Word (1 Corinthians 1:30; Colossians 2:3; James 1:5-6). <u>Thanksgiving</u> is a natural expression of our gratitude to the Lord for all His bountiful blessings. He alone is worthy of our highest <u>praise</u> (Revelation 4:11). <u>Power</u> points to the supremacy of God over both good and evil forces, and His unlimited ability to fulfill His promises (Ephesians 3:20).

The concluding <u>Amen</u>, which means "so be it," signifies the full support of the innumerable host of people who stand before the throne. They shall hunger no more, neither thirst any more ...For the Lamb who is in the midst of the throne shall feed them, and shall lead them to living fountains of waters; and God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes (Revelation 7:16-17).

Life is exceedingly short compared to eternity; and the trials we are now passing through will seem insignificant compared to the glorious privilege of soon being in the presence of the King of kings and singing His praises.

These victorious ones *have washed their robes, and made them white in the blood of the Lamb* (7:14). God deserves our highest praise for what He is in Himself, and for His great love in giving us eternal life.

Therefore they are before the throne of God and serve Him day and night in His Temple (Revelation 7:15).

GOD HAS THE FINAL WORD!

"Forever, O LORD, Your word is settled in heaven." "...but the word of God is not chained. For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ, for it is the power of God to salvation for everyone who believes..." (Psalm 119:89, II Timothy 2:9 and Romans 1:16)

A friendly acquaintance of ours will graciously invite us to visit and using the expression: "Come over and kill some time". But the bottom line is that you can not kill time without hurting eternity! Time is a <u>gift</u> from God and 'we' are accountable how we invest it! Even 'our' 'words' we are accountable for! "But I say to you that for every idle word men may speak, they will give account of it in the day of judgment" Matthew 12:36.

Being now is the month of February I am thinking of the story of the gentleman who is expressing in a letter to his 'girlfriend' how much he loves her. In this letter he shares that just to be with her in her presence, he is willing is go through hail, storm, cold weather, etc. and then states if it is warm and sunny he will be over to see her. (Sounds like a *fair weather Christian* - IF there is such a thing) <u>Really our love for JESUS is tested by</u> <u>our obedience to **His Word!**</u>

Isn't it *marvelous* that God knows 'my' heart like an open book; that He knows my very intent and motivation, and as a 'believer,' it is more *marvelous* that with repentance and confession, I have ALL my SINS brought under the *Blood* of our crucified and risen *Savior*, and thus forgiven and forgotten by Almighty God for eternity! "This is a faithful saying: For if we died with Him, We shall also live with Him. If we endure, We shall also reign with Him. If we deny Him, He also will deny us. If we are faithless, He remains faithful; He cannot deny Himself" II Timothy 2:11-13.

"You have dealt well with Your servant, O LORD, according to Your word. Teach me good judgment and knowledge, For I believe Your commandments. Before I was afflicted I went astray, But now I keep Your word" Psalm 119:65-67.

As we 'contend for the faith' (Jude 3), we need to be aware of the fact that 'liberalism' creeps in wherever it gets a chance. Could it also be true today when frequently at 'Bible Studies' etc. we hear: 'I <u>think</u>', or 'that's how I <u>feel</u>', or 'how do you <u>think</u> so and so <u>felt</u> back in the Bible times?' <u>By NO means am I seeking to</u> <u>quench free</u> input into a Bible Study or a Fellowship gathering: BUT in one sense of the WORD who cares

what you and I think, feel - but what does the WORD say for after all that is the 'Final Authority'! Be careful though as "However, when He, the Spirit of truth, has come, He will guide you into all truth: for He will not speak on His own authority, but whatever He hears He will speak: and He will tell you things to come. He will glorify Me, for He will take of what is Mine and declare it to you" John 16:13-14. "If you love Me, keep My commandments. And I will pray the Father, and He will give you another Helper, that He may abide with you forever - the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive, because it neither sees Him nor knows Him; but you know Him, for He dwells with you and will be in you" John 14:15-17. As Hans Neilsen Hauge stated: "A believer (Christian) is removed from the condemnation of the Law, but not compliance to the Law."

I realize that some folk don't like to 'hear' sound doctrine based on the <u>Holy Word</u> of God as they have '*itching ears*' (II Timothy 4:1-5); but that's 'their' problem! (Likely we have some *even* among our 'readers' of the *Morning Glory* who don't like to be told the TRUTH: but we are to tell the <u>Truth in love!</u> (Ephesians 4:15)

Our house dog, Mickey, a Lhasa Apso, so often reminds me of our struggles/battles between the 'old nature' and the 'new nature) (II Cor. 5:17) as he has such an affectionate, loving manner, and yet he sees how far he can stretch his freedom and yet be in good standing with his master. Actually you don't have to do anything to *drift!* An admonition especially for the believer is found in Hebrews 2:1-3; "*Therefore we must give the more earnest heed to the things we have heard, lest we drift away. For if the word spoken through angels proved steadfast, and every transgression and disobedience received a just reward, how shall we escape if we neglect so great a salvation,...*" The song writer of "Come, Thou Fount of Every Blessing" so wisely put it in stanzas three:

"O to grace how great a debtor, Daily I'm constrained to be; Let that grace now like a fetter, Bind my wand'ring heart to Thee. Prone to wander, Lord, I feel it, Prone to leave the God I love; Here's my heart, O take and seal it, Seal it for Thy courts above."

Isn't it something that the 'old nature' actually grows: "that you put off, concerning your former conduct, the old man which grows corrupt according to the deceitful lusts" Ephesians 4:22 and thus the spiritual recipe is **Ephesians 4:17-24. But** some will say: 'that I am just human' which is not true <u>if</u> you are a child of God! "Or do you not know that your body is the temple of the Holy Spirit who is in you, whom you have from God, and you are not your own? For you were bought at a price; therefore glorify God in your body and in your spirit, which are God's" I Corinthians 6:19-20.

According to God in the book of James; for an example states: **"Thus also faith by itself, if it does not have works, is dead"** James 2:17. (Ephesians 2:8-10).

If I am not mistaken Martin Luther states that a *'liv-ing faith'* always struggles and ends up at Calvary.

ENCOURAGEMENT

The "No Mores" of Revelation

By A. J. Gordon (1836-1895)

You will observe how the happiness of our glorified state is described entirely by negative terms - no curse, no pain, no death, etc. Thus God tells us what the eternal glory shall not be, rather than what it shall be. Does not the photographer use a negative with which to take your picture? The principle is precisely the same.

The negatives are used in order to show us the positive. We know what suffering and pain and death are; show us their opposites, and we shall have the best possible idea of the perfect state. These negatives are given to us in seven terms:

- 1. No more sea (Rev. 21:1)
- 2. No more sorrow (vs. 4)
- 3. No more crying (vs. 4)
- 4. No more pain (vs. 4)
- 5. *No more curse (22:3)*
- 6. No more night (v. 5)
- 7. No more death (21:4)

1. No More Sea!

How did Christ describe the present disturbed and troubled state of things in His sermon on the last things? He speaks of wars and persecutions and distress and then adds, "*The sea and the waves roaring; Men's hearts failing them for fear, and for looking after those things which are coming on the earth*" (Luke 21:25, 26).

Twice our Lord was with His disciples on the stormy sea. The first time, He calmed the waves; the second time He calmed their hearts in the storm before calming the waters. The latter is what He does now. He gives to His people peace in conflict, but not yet peace from conflict. "In the world ye shall have tribulation," He says in John 16:33. But in the same verse, He says, "In me ye might have peace."

During this whole present order of things, there will be tumult and disorder and strife. "*The wicked are like the troubled sea, when it cannot rest, whose waters cast up mire and dirt*" (Isa. 57:20). In the midst of all this storm and upheaval, it is possible for us to sink into Christ that we might have calmness and quietness of spirit, so that "*the peace of God, which passeth all understanding, shall keep* (our) *hearts and minds through Christ Jesus*" (Phil. 4:7).

Christ calms the heart now, but only when He comes in glory will He calm the sea. Then, stretching His nail-pierced hands over the great deeps of the world's sorrows, He will say, "Peace, be still." All the waves will be hushed into silence, all turbulence stilled, all strife ended; and there will be only that peace which is like a river flowing forth from the City of God to all earth's weary nations.

2. No More Sorrow!

We take no melancholy view of things, but we believe that a perfectly candid estimate compels the conviction that the sum of human misery in the world vastly outweighs the sum of human happiness. Job gave in a few words the inspired estimate of human life: "*Man that is born of a woman is of few days, and full of trouble*" (14:1).

Those whose outward lot is most fortunate confess that they are haunted by a strange melancholy at times, a kind of home sickness, as though somehow they had wandered away from their father's house.

Notice how the psalmist expresses this: "Oh that I had wings like a dove! For then would I fly away, and be at rest" (56:6); but as the dove sent forth from Noah's ark found no rest for the soles of its feet, so it is with the rest-less human spirit. It may change the scene, but it escapes not the sorrow.

There is no place to build its nest where it cannot be reached by the storm and shaken by the tempest. "Who are these that fly as a cloud, and as the doves to their windows?" asks the prophet (Isa. 60:8). It is the Home-going of God's saved. The windows of the New Jerusalem are at last open; man's long-lost home in Paradise is restored to him. He hears a word uttered that was never spoken since Adam was thrust forth from Paradise – "There shall be no more sorrow."

3. No More Crying!

Tears are the outward emblem of sorrow, and now God has wiped away all tears from the eyes of them that mourn. And there shall be "*no more …crying*." Do you know of any promise anywhere like that?

We hear people talk about the blessed release of death, but the death that gives you release opens a fountain of sorrow that years cannot close in the hearts of those whom you leave behind. "*Put thou my tears into thy bottle*," prays David (Ps. 56:8).

We have read that in ancient graves in the East, they have found vials laid away with the dead – supposed to be those in which their mourning friends gathered their tears for the departed and treasured them up. Whether or not the fact is literally true, it is symbolically true.

From the time of the first death in the human family, there are few out of the myriads who have died who have not had some person to mourn for them. A vial of tears has been put into every grave. Tell me, can you conceive of any statement so expressive of the infinite triumph of peace and blessedness as this: "*And there shall be no more* ...*crying*"?

4. No More Pain!

It is a pathetic fact that as we advance in refinement and culture, we become proportionately more susceptible to pain. The more perfectly the nerves are tuned, the more sensitive they are to discord, so that the difference between a saint and a savage is as the difference between a Cremona violin and an Indian tom-tom. The latter, because it is discord itself, knows no discord; and so the savage has only a dull apprehension of the highest pain.

But let the soul be tuned by the hand of God, and how sensitive it becomes to the suffering of our great humanity – how it thrills with pain at the anguish of the world! Therefore, instead of being lifted above pain by the Gospel, we are only brought into accord with it. And so God must change the world before He can blot out pain. And this He will do – wipe out the last vestige of sin and woe; then, and then only, will He wipe the tears from all faces.

5. No More Curse!

The earth, the man and the woman – this trinity of sufferers from the Fall – will be lifted up into final and inseparable fellowship with God.

6. No More Night!

"They that sleep sleep in the night; and they that be drunken are drunken in the night" (1 Thess. 5:7). "Them also which sleep in Jesus will God bring with him" (4:14) when He comes.

The cemetery, the sleeping place, will be untenanted of all the saints when Jesus comes. Weeping endured for the night, but now it is morning, and joy cometh in the morning. No more night because there is:

7. No More Death!

All hope, all deliverance, all victory is contained in that word. We say that now of Christians, who die a triumphant death. But such language is true only in a figure. It can be really true only when the trumpet shall sound and the dead shall be raised incorruptible.

Now, when one dies, life is swallowed up in defeat; now, death is the last ending. But then will come our glorious Friend who shall pluck us out of death's power. Not patient submission to the grave, not the disembodied state or the unclothed spirit is our supreme attainment. We await the time when death itself shall die and the grave shall be forever buried.

"Who also hath made us able ministers of the new testament; not of the letter, but of the spirit: for the letter killeth, but the spirit giveth life". II Corinthians 3:6.

The letter kills, while the Spirit gives life. One can be as clear as crystal on doctrine and just as cold and hard in applying it to others. That fact, however, is no excuse for disregarding sound doctrine, but a reminder that truth is to be spoken in love, while not compromising. Of course there are peripheral matters upon which there can be disagreement – but not when it affects the salvation of souls. Unfortunately, a false gospel is being preached today, and Paul said that those who do so are under God's curse.

The Berean Call

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"My soul trusteth in Thee; yea, in the shadow of Thy wings will I make my refuge, until those calamities be overpast" Ps. 57:1.

Here we have an illustration from the world of nature; a young bird is learning to fly. Above him soars a bird of prey. The sound of the powerful wings of the large bird frightens the young bird. But the mother bird is watching. She spreads her wings, and under them the frightened fledgling seeks refuge. There the young bird is safe. The bird of prey may keep circling overhead, but the young bird is no longer afraid. He has taken refuge under the mother's wings.

In like manner, a human soul may be aware of evil forces hovering overhead, dangers which threaten. Anxiously the soul turns in every direction for deliverance; and the deliverance is found with God: "My soul trusteth in Thee; yea, in the shadow of Thy wings will I make my refuge, until these calamities be overpast."

Origin of the Races

"These are the families of the sons of Noah, after their generations, in their nations: and by these were the nations divided in the earth after the flood." (Genesis 10:32)

This is the concluding verse of the tenth chapter of Genesis, known as "The Table of Nations." It tells us that all the original nations of the world were formed from the descendants of Noah. The basis of this worldwide division was their dispersion at Babel (Genesis 11:19), "every one after his tongue, after their families, in their nations" (Genesis 10:5; see also 10:20 and 10:31). Lest anyone think this list of original nations is simply folklore, he should remember that William F. Albright, probably the greatest archaeologist of the twentieth century, called it "an astonishingly accurate document." Many ethnologists still speak of Japhetic, Hamitic, and Semitic peoples and languages.

But what about the origin of races? One searches the Bible in vain for this information, for neither the word nor the *concept* of "race" appears in the Bible at all! There is no such thing as a race – except the human race! Skin color and other supposed racial characteristics are mere recombinations of innate genetic factors, originally created in Adam and Eve to permit development of different family characteristics as the human race was commanded to multiply and fill the earth (Genesis 1:28; 9:1).

"Race" is strictly an evolutionary concept used by Darwin, Huxley, Haeckel, and the other nineteenth-century evolutionists to rationalize their white racism. But from the beginning it was not so! "God that made the world and all things therein; ...hath made of one blood all nations of men for to dwell on all the face of the earth" (Acts 17:24, 26). "Have we not all one father? Hath not one God created us? Why do we deal treacherously every man against his brother?" (Malachi 2:10). HMM

Assurance doesn't come by the life I live, for then I could not have my assurance upon receiving Christ, but only after I had lived for Him long enough to 'Prove' that I was a real Christian. Paul says that one who doesn't have even one good work is yet truly saved if he believes on Christ. John 5:24 says of those who believe, that they have "passed from death unto life." This happens at the moment of believing on Christ." The Berean Call

"'He who believes in Him is not condemned; but he who does not believe is condemned already; because he has not believed in the name of the only begotten Son of God. He who believes in the Son has everlasting life; and he who does not believe the Son shall not see life, but the wrath of God abides on him."" John 3:18 & 36.

Editor's Note: To 'believe' is to come and to come unto **Jesus** is believing in <u>action/a living faith</u>.

Read Matthew 5-6

Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, but He grew to manhood in Nazareth of Galilee (Matthew 2:22-23). He left Galilee to be baptized by John the Baptist in Judea; but, when Jesus had herd that John was cast into prison, He departed into Galilee; And leaving Nazareth, He came and dwelt in Capernaum, which is on the sea coast (of Galilee). ...From that time Jesus began to preach, and to say, Repent: for the Kingdom of Heaven is at hand ...And His fame went throughout all Syria ...And there followed Him great multitudes of people from Galilee, and from ...Jerusalem, and from Judea, and from beyond Jordan (4:12-13, 17, 24-25; see Isaiah 9:1-2).

Near the Sea of Galilee, Jesus was followed to an open mountainside where He sat down and, as King of His Kingdom, proclaimed ten basic principles to guide the conduct of those who choose to be citizens of His Kingdom. We know this proclamation as the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5-7).

He began by saying: *Blessed are the poor in spirit* (5:3). No one born into this world is "poor in spirit" by nature. Instead, our natures are completely opposite. We are born with the proud, self-willed nature of Adam, and the world does its utmost to encourage our pride. The basic foundation for the true believer is a desire to be emptied of self-confidence and self-will. Such persons acknowledge their sins and recognize that, without the Lord, they are truly poor and destitute of spiritual life, as Jesus said: *Without Me you can do nothing* (that has any eternal value) (John 15:5). Consequently, they never take credit for achievements, but praise the Lord for His enabling.

Jesus identified His true disciples by saying that true followers *hunger and thirst after righteousness* (Matthew 5:6).

Our supreme desire, above everything else in life, is to become more like Christ, to be a fellowship with Him, and to accomplish the purposes for which He created us. Far too many professing Christians have not truly made Christ as Lord of their lives; they merely *hunger and thirst* for His present blessings and eventual salvation. They seek miracles, health, wealth, and material prosperity. However, hungering and thirsting after His righteousness is the supreme motive of all true children of God, who, above all, *seek first His kingdom and His righteousness*, knowing that Jesus promised: *All the things* (necessary for life) *shall be added to them* (6:31-33).

There is something unique and satisfying about the Word of God, since it is also our source of spiritual strength. Christians *desire the sincere milk of the Word, that they may grow thereby* (1 Peter 2:2).

If therefore your eye be single, your whole body shall

be full of light. But if your eye be evil, your whole body shall be full of darkness. If therefore the light that is in you be darkness, how great is that darkness! (Matthew 6:22-23).

The eye determines the intentions of the heart, what we do and think about. A single eye has just one primary focus or aim, if our desire is to glorify God and seek His honor. Paul said: *To me to live is Christ* (Philippians 1:21); and, if that is the unwavering conviction of our hearts, then *the whole body will be full of light*. In contrast, it is said of the unregenerate: *The eyes of man are never satisfied* (Proverbs 27:20).

If, while we profess to be a Christian, we are merely devoted to seeking our own goals in life, then, *how great is that darkness!* To illustrate, the majority of the religious leaders of Jesus' time were longing for their Messiah. However, their concern was not in worshiping and submitting to Him as Lord of their lives, but in His restoration of Israel's kingdom, which would free them from Roman rule. Our character is conformed to that which we treasure most. *As a man thinks in his heart, so is he* (Proverbs 23:7).

Jesus Christ Our Hope In This World

Colossians 1:26-27, 2:6-10 Townley (Toby) R. Knutson

Do you have hope in your heart today? As we look into God's infallible Word, we see the Apostle Paul writing to the church at Colassae and to you and me. The question I raise to you today is, do you have hope in your heart? Now, I am not talking of a hope that is kind of a "hope so". Kind of like, I hope it rains today, or I hope I don't get the flu this winter. But the Word of God speaks of a hope for eternity and thru this truth our hearts are lifted up in hope today.

Have you ever been really hoping for something or that someone would do something for you and then you were crushed because you were let down? Yes, this happens in this world, but today lets look at the One who will never let us down and He is our true hope for all eternity.

Come with me, right back to the basics of all spiritual life:

A. Verse 2:6 - "As ye have therefore received Christ Jesus the Lord, …"

1. This verse is speaking to the born again believers, those who know the Lord Jesus Christ as their Lord and Saviour.

a. John 1:12 "But as many as received Him, to them gave He power to become the sons of God, even to them that believe on His name."b. Are you one of these believers?

B. Verses 1:26-27 "Even the mystery which hath been hid from ages and from generations, but now is made manifest to His saints: To whom God would make known what is the riches of the glory of this mystery among the Gentiles; which is Christ in you (or among you), the hope of glory:"

C. Verse 2:6b "...so walk ye in Him;"

2. Friends, if you know the Lord Jesus on a personal basis, walk in His truths, walk in His footsteps. He only is the source of the hope that we all need.

3. You may ask, how do we "... walk in Him?"

a. I want to tell you that the Pilgrim walk with our Lord is not a cake walk, so to speak. There are trials, sufferings, persecutions and heartaches, but praise God, Jesus has overcome the world and all of its sufferings and gives us hope for eternity.

I) I Peter 2:21 tells us, "For even hereunto were ye called: because Christ also suffered for us, leaving us an example, that ye should follow His steps." Yes, walk in Him!! D. Verse 2:7 "Rooted and built up in Him, and established in the faith, as ye have been taught, abounding therein with thanksgiving."

 How are Christians rooted and built up in Him?

 a. Studying His Holy Word, praying, meditating on His Word, being in Bible studies, fellowshipping with other believers, serving others and yes, coming to Chapel services.

E. Verse 2:8 "Beware lest any man spoil you through philosophy and vain deceit, after the tradition of men, after the rudiments of the world, and not after Christ."

5. Dear friends, please listen carefully. The Bible tells us there are false teachers that would like to bring a false gospel to your ears. Always hold all teaching and preaching up to the Word of God, including the message you are hearing today.

F. Verse 2:9 *"For in Him dwelleth all the fullness of the Godhead bodily."*

6. Jesus Christ is our all in all. We must be careful when someone would say that, for salvation, we need to do our part. No, No. Jesus Christ alone has paid for our redemption.

7. This verse is not just empty wording, but Jesus Christ is in reality our only hope in this sin cursed world. He is our Creator, Redeemer, Saviour, Messiah, Jehovah, Lamb of God, God Himself and yet He is fully man as well. He is our blessed hope. Praise His Holy Name!

8. Do you know Jesus? If not, do you want to know Him?

G. Verse 2:10 "And ye are complete in Him, which is the head of all principality and power:"

9. Complete: lacking none of the parts.

10. We bring nothing to the table of salvation apart from our sin and shame.

11. Ephesians 3:19 tells us, "And to know the love of Christ, which passeth knowledge, that ye might be filled with all the fullness of God."

12. Ephesians 1:22-23 "And hath put all things under His feet, and gave Him to be the head over all things to the church. Which is His body, the fullness of Him that filleth all in all."

Dear friends, because Jesus is the fullness of God, He is our Redeemer, Creator, Sanctifier and He alone took away the penalty of our sin, why would anyone want to try to go anywhere but to Jesus Christ for his hope. Jesus is our only hope you know.

We see in Ephesians 2:12 what our cause was like before Christ came to live in our hearts, "That at that time ye were without Christ, being aliens from the commonwealth of Israel, and strangers from the covenants of promise, having no hope, and without God in the world:"

Also, now in closing we want to again see the source of our hope, "Now our Lord Jesus Christ Himself, and God, even our Father, which hath loved us, and hath given us everlasting consolation and good hope through grace." Yes, He provides good hope and only thru His grace thru faith. Amen.

"Whosoever drinketh of the water that I shall give him shall never thirst" (John 4:14).

JESUS knew the human heart. He saw its thirst. It is sin that has 1eft this burning thirst. Sin has closed our hearts to God. And it is the resulting vacuum within our souls which is constantly crying out for something, knowing not for what it cries.

It turns therefore first to one thing and then to another in the hope of quenching its thirst. Men begin with diversion, then turn to pleasure, then to amusements; many even resort to the muddied waters of vice – their souls are so thirsty!

But none of these things help; they afford only momentary relief. Like an anesthetic. But when one comes out of an anesthetic, one is as thirsty as ever, and nauseated besides.

Thereupon many turn to other sources of relief.

They throw themselves into their work. They become useful, even outstanding, prominent in their fields. And their souls feel relieved for a while. "This was something really worth living for," they say.

Whereupon they proceed to fill their souls with love of honor, gain, or the desire for power.

But the more they drink, the more thirsty they become. And while men praise them for their abilities, in dire distress their tortured souls cry out for help.

It is God for whom you are thirsting, my friend.

You yourself have understood this. At least now and then. This has been the worst feature of it, too, as far as you have been concerned. For you would not go to God. You knew that if you did go you would have to live a different life.

As long as you yourself insist upon drinking *poison*, Jesus cannot help you.

But if you this day are willing, Jesus will quench your thirsting soul.

Making A Difference in Time and ETERNITY!

Faith without works is dead. For a long time I have been intrigued and amazed at the statement in the Holy Bible: "Jesus Saw/sees Their Faith"! How did 'Jesus see their faith'? *By their reaction!* Faith is not only a noun, but a verb, **action/response!**
