Immortality. To be remembered. Some people's greatest fear is to die and be forgotten.

All these attempts at earthly immortality fail. Ponce de Leon didn't find the fountain of youth and he died, and so will we if the Lord tarries. Life eternal is not in anti-aging drugs, not in wigs, not in dying your hair, and not in fame. It is the same for all people. The ultimate statistic is that 10 out of 10 people die.

And so...we are left alone. Not really trusting in God and at the same time, we have longings for eternity in our hearts. This is what Easter is all about. Easter is God's attempt to convince us that there is life after death. Easter is God convincing us that death has been destroyed, that there is life beyond the grave. Easter is God convincing us that there is no need for us to try to create eternal life here on earth. On that first Easter morning, the women came to the grave, thinking there was only death, and Jesus appeared to them and convinced them and the other disciples that there was life after death. And that same Power is at work today, for Easter is God convincing you of God's eternal love and life for you and me.

I would like to share a story I ran across years ago. "Once upon a time I had a young friend named Philip. Philip was born with Down Syndrome. He was a pleasant child – happy, it seemed – but increasingly aware of the difference between himself and other children. Philip went to Sunday school, a third-grade class with nine other eight-year-old boys and girls. Philip, because of his differences, was not readily accepted. The teacher was creative, and they learned, they laughed, they played together. And they really cared about one another, even though eight-year-olds don't say they care about each other out loud. But he also knew that Philip was not really a part of that group. Philip did not choose nor did he want to be different. He just was. And that was just the way things were.

My friend had a marvelous idea for his class the Sunday after Easter. You know those things that pantyhose come in, the containers that look like great big eggs, my friend had collected ten of them. The children loved it when he brought them into the room. Each child was to get one. It was a beautiful spring day, and the assignment was for each child to go outside, find a symbol for new life, put it into the egg, and bring it back to the classroom. They would then open and share their new life symbols one by one.

It was glorious. It was confusing. It was wild. They ran all around the church grounds, gathering their symbols and returned to the classroom. They put all the eggs on a table, and then the teacher began to open them. All the children stood around the table.

He opened one, and there was a flower, and they oohed and aahed. He opened another, and there was a little butterfly. "Beautiful," the girls all said. He opened another, and there was a rock. And as third graders will, some laughed, and some said, "That's crazy! How's a rock supposed to be like new life?" But the smart little boy who'd found it spoke up: "That's mine. And I knew all of you would get flowers and buds and leaves and butterflies and stuff like that. So I got a rock because I wanted to be different. And for me, that's new life." They all laughed.

My teacher friend opened the next one. There was nothing there. The other children, as eight-year-olds will, said, "That's not fair – That's stupid! – somebody didn't do it right."

Then my teacher friend felt a tug on his shirt and he looked down. Philip was standing beside him, "It's mine," Philip said. "It's mine." And the children said, "You don't ever do things right, Philip. There's nothing there!" "I did so do it," Philip said. "I did do it. It's empty. The tomb is empty!' There was silence, a very full silence. And for you people who don't believe in miracles, I want to tell you that one happened that day last spring. From that time on, it was different. Philip suddenly became a part of that group of eight-year-old children. They took him in. He was set free from the tomb of his differentness.

Philip died last summer. His family had known since the time he was born that he wouldn't live out a full life span. Many other things had been wrong with his tiny body. And so, late last July, with an infection that most normal children could have quickly shrugged off, Philip died. The mystery simply enveloped him.

At the funeral, nine, eight-year-old children marched up to the altar, not with flowers to cover the stark reality of death. Nine eight-year-olds, with their Sunday school teacher, marched right up to that altar, and laid on it an empty egg, an empty, old, discarded pantyhose egg." (Harry Pritchett, Jr, Leadership Magazines Summer 1985)

That's the hope of the fountain of youth, an empty egg, signifying an empty grave. He has risen just as he said. To have it be Easter and still be attempting to foolishly find the fountain of youth here on earth? To have it Easter morning and not really trust that God has intended for us to live eternally with Him? To have it Easter morning and not to believe that there will be millions of lights on and waiting for us in the heavenly mansion? Why, it is like living in springtime and not seeing the beauty all around us.

Easter is God convincing us of the sure and certain hope that our mothers and fathers, our grandmothers and grandfathers, our sons and daughters, and all those who have died in Christ are with him. That is the Gospel. So, bring out the trumpets! Bring out the cymbals! Bring out the shouting voices because Jesus Christ has been raised from the dead by the eternal powers of God.

"I am the resurrection and the life; he who believes in Me will live even if he dies, and everyone who lives and believes in Me will never die. Do you believe this?" (John 11:25-26) — WMA

Devotionals for Easter

GETHSEMANE

"Then comes Jesus with them unto a place called Gethsemane, and said unto His disciples, "Sit ye here, while I go yonder and pray." (Matt. 26:36)

GETHSEMANE! A quiet place with flowers and upstanding trees. There Jesus had His severest struggle. All that He is in soul and spirit, in feeling and disposition is made to be sin on our behalf. Now He lies in the crucible over hell fire. God, holy and righteous, meets Him. All that we owed was demanded of Him: the account had to be paid.

Here in this garden the matter must be settled in its deepest essence. It was in a garden that Adam was disobedient. It is in a garden that Jesus must conquer by being perfectly obedient. If He is not victorious here, He will not reach Calvary, and all is lost.

Gethsemane! Heaven looks down into this garden, and listens and trembles. With quiet strength and complete truth the words sound forth while His sweat falls to the ground like drops of blood: "Not as I will, but as Thou wilt"– "Father, glorify Thy name!" – and the victory is won.

Let Judas come now; let friends forsake Him. Judgment and death may now take Him to Golgotha. Do ye seek Me? Did I not tell you that I am He? Overcome by this bloodless victory, those rough soldiers went backward, and fell to the ground. They had not the power to seize so great and victorious a Leader: He must urge them to take Him. He hastens on to Golgotha. Erect, He stands forth and moves on toward death, quiet as a lamb. He goes to be made perfect as the Author of our salvation.

The hour in dark Gethsemane I never shall forget, When Christ alone the battle fought, In grief and bloody sweat. Gethsemane, Gethsemane, I must remember thee, Where God's eternal Son I saw In prayer on bended knee.

GOLGATHA

"They took Jesus therefore: and He went out, bearing the cross for Himself unto the place called the place of a skull, which is called in Hebrew, Golgotha: where they crucified Him." (John 19:17-18) Golgotha! You wonderful, holy hill! When we mention your name, a surge of deep seriousness, a quiet joy, and heartfelt thanks pass through our spirit. What is the Church?

"And I say also unto thee, That thou art Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church; and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it." (Matthew 16:18)

I don't think a lot of people know. I don't think a lot of professing Christians know. My definition has steadily gotten narrower over the years. Some of my friends think it's gotten too narrow. If we take scripture seriously, if we take Christ's words seriously, I don't see how we can come to any conclusion other than that most of what is out there and is called the church is not the church, and most of what we see out there and is called Christian, although it might be religious, is not Christian.

You hear people constantly referring to recent surveys taken that give us some startling statistics. They say that there is just as much abortion in the church as outside of the church. They say that there is just as much divorce inside the church as outside the church. They say there is just as much adultery, fornication, pornography, greed, materialism and you can go on and list the sins ad-nauseam. Now we all know the church is not perfect and that the church can and does sin, but those statistics are lies. Not that the people taking the polls are lying to us. But the pollsters let the people self-identify themselves and they are either lying or deceived. We know that Jesus said that many would self-identify themselves as Christians and say to Him "Lord, Lord" and He will declare to them, "Depart from Me, I never knew you."

Do you want to read a description of the church? Turn to Matthew chapter 5 and read the beatitudes. The first beatitude says: "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven." And the last beatitude says in verse 10: "Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven." What's the "Kingdom of Heaven"? Is it not His new covenant people? Jesus in His sermon on the mount tells us how we can recognize His church, His new Covenant people. How does Jesus describe the people who belong to the Kingdom of Heaven, the church? These who are the blessed of God are humble, broken, meek, they hunger and thirst after righteousness, they are merciful, pure in heart, peacemakers, I believe that means they are evangelistic, they help others to find peace with God, and they are persecuted, not for their stupidity, but for their righteousness sake.

That's how Jesus describes the citizens of the kingdom of heaven, His church. We need to stop calling all this other stuff the church. We need to stick to the Bible's definition of what a Christian is and what the church is and have some surgery. The church can either judge itself, or we can wait for God to do it. Christ will have a pure bride, a holy bride. The root of the word "holy" means "to cut and separate". It would be like having a sharp surgical knife, and to cut away a cancerous growth and to separate it from the healthy flesh. It would be like taking a cut of beef and cutting away all the fat and gristle and separating it from the good cut of meat.

In order to be holy we need to be cut away from and separated from the world, and the word of God is described as a surgical knife cutting deep to the bone and marrow to remove the sin from our life. Sanctification describes the process Christians go through that is constant. As we continue to go into the word, all the fat and the gristle and tumors get cut away from our lives and we grow day by day in grace and holiness.

The church goes through the same process, at least it's supposed to. Through the unadulterated preaching of the word of God and the exercise of church discipline, members involved in open sin are either to be restored or removed. The church is to be Holy unto God and the spotless Bride of Christ and by God's sovereign Will, it is happening. We have a hard time seeing it in this country because there is still so much fat and gristle hanging on. But before any real surgery can happen we need a new definition and understanding of what the church is.

Forget about all these things you hear about, how messed up the church is. Religion is always messed up, but not the church. The church is humble and broken and seeks the pleasure of its Master.

We must not compare ourselves with other churches. We must compare ourselves with scripture and tremble. Listen to what God says in Isaiah 66:2, "But on this one will I look: On him who is poor and of a contrite spirit, And who trembles at My word." Have you ever read God's word and trembled? If so, praise God. That is a good place to be, because you have recognized your need for God.

I am not speaking perfection here, some do. I don't, I

can easily say with Paul, "I am the chief of sinners". So I am not talking about perfection, but direction. Our lives should be moving toward holiness, realizing we will not achieve it until we are face to face with Jesus.

EASTER SUNDAY

"Who was delivered up for our trespasses, and was raised for our justification." (Romans 4:25)

EASTER Sunday records the greatest event in the history of the world.

Made alive in the Spirit, Jesus breaks the portals of Hades and opens the way from the dark valley of death to the fair land of life.

The power of death is now broken. The powers of death must surrender also the body.

That is what happened on Easter Sunday, when the body of Jesus was raised from the dead.

This is wonderful.

But the Easter Gospel has a still more glorious message to us who are not only marked by death but are also in ourselves death-sentenced criminals. It proclaims to us that the bodily resurrection of Christ is God's own signature affixed to the letter of pardon which Jesus applied for on our behalf.

When God ushered Jesus out through the portals of death and brought forth His body from the tomb, He made it clear to heaven and earth, yes, to hell also, that He had put His seal of approval upon that reconciliation with the race which was effected by the death of Jesus. Therefore the apostle says: "Raised for our justification."

Here we have Easter's most joyous message: my acquittal papers with God's own signature affixed thereto have been ready and waiting for me since Easter morning. If I stand beneath the cross of Jesus, I can read the charge that was against me; but I can see also that it has all been transferred to my Savior's account.

In His open tomb I find again my God-given proof that Jesus has paid for my sins, and I am free.

Who is he that condemneth? It is Christ Jesus that died, yea, rather, that was raised from the dead, who is at the right hand of God! Alleluia!

Is Taking Pot OK for a Christian?

Several states have legalized marijuana for recreational use. Some people, even in the church, feel that they can take it. The reasoning is that since it isn't against the law, then it is OK for me. But what does the Bible say about it?

The Bible doesn't specifically say "You Shall Not take Marijuana" but it certainly does state what marijuana does to a person is specifically forbidden.

"Now the deeds of the flesh are evident, which are: immorality, impurity, sensuality, idolatry, sorcery, enmities, strife, jealousy, outbursts of anger, disputes, dissensions, factions, envying, drunkenness, carousing, and things like these, of which I forewarn you just as I have forewarned you that those who practice such things shall not inherit the kingdom of God." (Galatians 5:19-21)

The word that is verse 20 that is translated "sorcery" is literally "pharmakia" where we get our english word "pharmacy." It refers to a drug that alters your mental state. It could include a "potion" from a "sorcerer" that would induce a spell upon a person, but it includes every drug that alters our mental capacity. The end result of continuing to do this is that people "shall not inherit the Kingdom of God." (v. 20)

The Book of Revelation backs this up as it lists "sorcerers" as one of the classes of people who end up in the lake of fire and lost forever. "But for the cowardly and unbelieving and abominable and murderers and immoral persons and sorcerers and idolaters and all liars, their part will be in the lake that burns with fire and brimstone, which is the second death." (Revelation 21:8) This is the same word "pharmakia" as used before.

I don't know of any Lutheran denomination or group that has a full-time evangelist who still preaches around America. There used to be many of them pre-1970. Preaching evangelism is still effective if the preacher has the fire of God in his soul and a passion for the lost. God bless you at *Morning Glory*.

Expressions of Christian life on the personal order seems to be an uphill activity. Luke-warmness is in the atmosphere.

Christ Crucified

The Lutheran Church has always preached, "Christ crucified." It is one of the fundamental doctrines of Christianity. Christ is the center of Christianity. Without the teachings about His person and His work, Christianity would fall.

In Matthew 16:21 it is stated that, "From that time began Jesus to show unto his disciples, that he must go unto Jerusalem, and suffer many things of the elders and chief priests and scribes, and be killed." In Matthew 4:17 a similar juncture is indicated by the words, "From that time began Jesus to preach, and to say, Repent ye: for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." Having completed the last-named purpose, Jesus now plainly states that He must die. Veiled announcements of His death have been given before, but now He gives an open declaration. It came immediately after the confession of Peter, "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God." It seems that as soon as Jesus receives a confession from His followers as to His true identity, He at once proceeds to tell the purpose of His coming to earth, viz., to die.

Jesus was now nearing the climax of His ministry to give His life as a ransom for sinners. Justice demanded the death of the sinner. And this death is eternal separation from God. How then could man be saved? Here was the divine way of paying the penalty. Christ was to die. God had promised this to Adam and Eve. Throughout the whole Old Testament, the promise is repeated. Now, at last, He had come to perform that work. It was divine love that had made the promise. It was divine love that now had sent Christ. It was divine love that was now sending Jesus to Jerusalem. This was the wisdom of God, but man calls it folly.

It seems strange that the disciples should misunderstand Jesus in this matter, when He spoke so plainly.

They had difficulty in grasping that Jesus was to die and not ascend to an earthly throne. Nor did they seem to have any realization that Jesus would rise from the dead in a glorious victory.

"And Peter took him, and began to rebuke him, saying, Be it far from thee, Lord: this shall never be unto thee." To Peter, the prediction of Jesus' death, sounded like a confession of defeat. The Messiah should certainly not speak thus.

"But he turned, and said unto Peter, Get thee behind me, Satan: thou art a stumbling-block unto me: for thou mindest not the things of God, but the things of men." Please note that Jesus is here speaking to Peter, who had just made that marvelous confession. On this confession, Jesus said, He would build His Church. It was not on Peter. Can a church be built on such instability? Certainly Peter was not Satan. But he was the mouthpiece of Satan at the time. The Peters of today should be careful. All who try to tamper with the great truth, the necessity of Christ's death, had better be careful for whom they are speaking. Peter was a devoted follower of Jesus, but he was making a grave mistake. We cannot believe in his infallibility, either now or later.

Jesus had to tell him that he was a stumbling block. Oh, how many Peters and how many church members have been stumbling blocks to the Lord since! They mind the things of man instead of the things of God. Which are you minding? Are you ready to admit the wisdom of God? Or are you still mindful of the wisdom of man that is trying to do away with the cross? Are you doing without the cross?

Admit the wisdom of God and forsake the folly of man in regard to the cross of Christ. If Christ should return today and again preach the cross, without a doubt He would again be taken to Jerusalem to suffer and die. Falsehood cannot stand Christ today any more than it did then. Let us as Christians thank God for the cross that ended in victory in the resurrection.

Scripture and the Gay Christian Movement

This is the fourth in a series of articles about the movement to accept the gay lifestyle within the Christian church, including same-sex marriage and ordination of openly gay clergy. Scriptural texts will be looked at first from the Gay movement's analysis of them and then from the exegetical approach of what the verses are saying.

The Levitical Code

"You shall not lie with a male as one lies with a female; it is an abomination." (Leviticus 18:22)

"If there is a man who lies with a male as those who lie with a woman, both of them have committed a detestable act; they shall surely be put to death. Their bloodguiltiness is upon them." (Leviticus 20:13)

Gay Response

It's surprising that so many people continue to believe that these verses in Leviticus somehow form the heart of the theological debate about homosexuality. They are, in fact, of secondary significance to the later passage by Paul in Romans 1. And the reason for that isn't that their meaning is unclear, but that their context within the Old Testament Law makes them inapplicable to Christians. Much of the New Testament deals with the place of the old Law in the emerging Christian Church....

Although it's a common argument today, there's no reason to think that these two verses from the old Law in Leviticus would somehow have remained applicable to Christians, even when other much more central parts of the Law did not. In Galatians 6, Paul goes so far as to say that "In Christ, neither circumcision nor un-circumcision means anything." He speaks of the old Law as but a yoke of slavery and he warns Christians not to be burdened by. ... Christians have always regarded the Book of Leviticus, in particular, as being inapplicable to them in light of Christ's fulfillment of the Law. So while it is true that Leviticus prohibits male same-sex relations, it also prohibits a vast array of other behaviors, activities, and foods that Christians have never regarded as being prohibited for them. ...

Simply because something received the death penalty in the Old Testament doesn't mean that Christians should view it as sinful; there's too much variance for that to be a consistent and effective approach. The default Christian approach for nearly two millennia now has been to view the particular hundreds of rules and prohibitions in the Old Law as having been fulfilled by Christ's death, and there is no good reason why Leviticus 18:22 and 20:13 should be exceptions to that rule. ¹

Biblical Response #1

These statements in Leviticus are direct and are not vague in the least. It reminds us that there isn't one statement in all of Scripture that states anything favorable in the eyes of God about same-sex relations. Anytime that people say that same-sex relations are acceptable when they are in a committed, loving relationship are inventing something that the Scripture never states. These statements in Leviticus do not say that homosexual relations are an abomination punishable by death *unless* they are in a committed, loving relationship. They condemn the act regardless of the relationship the two are involved in.

The same is true in the New Testament as well. The Scriptures list acceptable relationships between husbands and wives, but never list any acceptable relationships between men with men or women with women in a committed, loving relationship. "Wives, be subject to your own husbands, as to the Lord. For the husband is the head of the wife, as Christ also is the head of the church, He Himself being the Savior of the body. But as the church is subject to Christ, so also the wives ought to be to their husbands in everything. Husbands, love your wives, just as Christ also loved the church and gave Himself up for her; that He might sanctify her, having cleansed her by the washing of water with the word, that He might present to Himself the church in all her glory, having no spot or wrinkle or any such thing; but that she should be holy and blameless. So husbands ought also to love their own wives as their own bodies. He who loves his own wife loves himself; for no one ever hated his own flesh, but nourishes and cherishes it, just as Christ also does the church, because we are members of His body. For this cause a man shall leave his father and mother, and shall cleave to his wife; and the two shall become one flesh. This mystery is great; but I am speaking with reference to Christ and the church. Nevertheless let each individual among you also love his own wife even as himself; and let the wife see to it that she respect her husband." (Ephesians 5:22-33)

To try and introduce two like genders into this as an acceptable form of marriage and sexuality in marriage is to destroy the very relationship between Christ and the church and the relationship within marriage itself. If two

men are in a so-called marriage, who is the head and who submits to who? God's only design for marriage and sexuality are one man and one woman.

Biblical Response #2

The argument that these verses don't apply to New Testament Christians because they are part of the Old Testament Law is to make a sweeping statement that isn't wholly true. When we look at the Old Testament Law, we see three parts in it: The Sacrificial Law, The Civil Law and the Moral Law. The Sacrificial Law applied to offerings of animals made to atone for sin that Israel was required to make. These are specifically now done away with in the New Testament because Christ has been sacrificed once for all and the previous sacrificial system is gone. "After saying above, 'Sacrifices and offerings and whole burnt offerings and sacrifices for sin Thou hast not desired, nor hast Thou taken pleasure in them' (which are offered according to the Law), then He said, 'Behold, I have come to do Thy will. 'He takes away the first in order to establish the second. By this will we have been sanctified through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all." (Hebrews 10:8-10)

The Civil Law applied to Israel as a civil nation and the rules that it used to govern the people in that time and culture. Remember that Israel was both a religious and civil nation together at the same time, so God could enact a civil punishment for a religious offense. "If there is a man who commits adultery with another man's wife, one who commits adultery with his friend's wife, the adulterer and the adulteress shall surely be put to death." (Leviticus 20:10) We don't practice this today because we are not Israel in that Old Testament civil law, and it is against the law of the land to kill adulterers. We let the Civil authorities determine which laws govern our land and people and submit to that law. (See Romans 13:1-7) Regarding unclean versus clean foods, Jesus declared all foods as being clean in the New Testament: "And He said to them, 'Are you so lacking in understanding also? Do you not understand that whatever goes into the man from outside cannot defile him; because it does not go into his heart, but into his stomach, and is eliminated?' (Thus He declared all foods clean.)" (Mark 7:18-19)

The Moral Law was given by God and transcends all people of all cultures of all time. The 10 Commandments are still God's Moral requirements of our relationship to God and to our fellow man. Each one of the 10 Commandments is repeated for us in the New Testament either directly or in principle demonstrated. The only change was in observance of the Sabbath Day from Saturday to Sunday in observance of Christ's resurrection on the first day of the week. (See Acts 20:7 and I Cor. 16:2) The key thing to notice here is that we use the New Testament to determine what applies to us today in the New Covenant and what does not. In regards to homosexuality, the New Testament DOES clearly condemn homosexuality and reinforces that part of the Levitical code for us. *"For this reason God gave them over to de-grading passions; for their women exchanged the natural function for that which is unnatural, and in the same way also the men abandoned the natural function of the woman and burned in their desire toward one another; men with men committing indecent acts and receiving in their own persons the due penalty of their error." (Romans 1:26-27)*

When the Scripture states that, "For Christ is the end of the law for righteousness to everyone who believes," (Romans 10:4) we must realize that this means our righteousness before God. We can't earn our own righteousness by obeying the Law because we are sinners and fall short of the perfection that God demands. Christ fulfilled the Law on our behalf through His sinless life, His Vicarious death and His bodily resurrection. We are not judged by the Law as far as our righteousness before God. But to state that there is now no laws to govern the New Testament Christian is completely wrong. Does this mean that the Christian is now free to have other gods before the Lord? Or are we free to commit adultery, or stealing, or lying or killing? No, not in the least! The Moral Law of God still guides us in right and wrong, as Jesus Himself said, "Do not think that I came to abolish the Law or the Prophets; I did not come to abolish, but to fulfill. For truly I say to you, until heaven and earth pass away, not the smallest letter or stroke shall pass away from the Law, until all is accomplished." (Matthew 5:17-18)

The Lamb Who Was Slain

Two young Moravians heard of an island in the West Indies where an atheist British owner had 2,000 to 3,000 slaves. And the owner had said, "No preacher, no clergyman, will ever stay on this island. If he's ship-wrecked we'll keep him in a separate house until he has to leave, but he's never going to talk to any of us about God, I'm through with all that nonsense." Three thousand slaves from the jungles of Africa brought to an island in the Atlantic and there to live and die without hearing of Christ.

Two young Moravians heard about it. They sold themselves to the British planter and used the money they received from their sale, for he paid no more than he would for any slave, to pay their passage out to his island for he wouldn't even transport them.

As the ship left its' pier in the river at Hamburg and was going out into the North Sea carried with the tide, the Moravians had come from Herrenhut to see these two lads off, in their early twenties. Never to return again, for this wasn't a four year term, they sold themselves into life time slavery. Simply that as slaves, they could be as Christians where these others were. The families were there weeping, for they knew they would never see them again. And they wondered why they were going and questioned the wisdom of it. As the gap widened and the housings had been cast off and were being curled up there on the pier, and the young boys saw the widening gap, one lad with his arm linked through the arm of his fellow, raised his hand and shouted across the gap the last words that were heard from them, they were these, "MAY THE LAMB THAT WAS SLAIN RECEIVE THE REWARD OF HIS SUFFERING!" This became the call of Moravian missions. And this is the only reason for being, that the Lamb that was slain may receive the reward of His suffering!

Do you know what it looks like to deny vourself and follow Christ?

In 1813, Adoniram Judson sailed to Burma from the shores of America with his wife Ann.

He was 24.

His wife Ann was 23.

They spent their lives for the glory of Christ among unreached peoples.

Before they married, Judson wrote a letter to Ann's father asking for his blessing in marriage. This is what he wrote in the letter:

"I have now to ask whether you can consent to part with your daughter early next spring, to see her no more in this world?

Whether you can consent to see her departure to a heathen land, and her subjection to the hardships and sufferings of a missionary life?

Whether you can consent to her exposure to the dangers of the ocean; to the fatal influence of the southern climate of India; to every kind of want and distress; to degradation, insult, persecution, and perhaps a violent death?

Can you consent to all this, for the sake of perishing immortal souls; for the sake of Zion and the glory of God?

Can you consent to all this, in hope of soon meeting your daughter in the world of glory, with a crown of righteousness brightened by the acclamations of praise which shall resound to her Saviour from heathens saved, through her means, from eternal woe and despair?"

Soon after accepting Judson's proposal of marriage and the life of a missionary, Ann wrote to a friend where she said the following:

"I feel willing, and expect, if nothing in providence prevents, to spend my days in this world in heathen lands. Yes, Lydia, I have about come to the determination to give up all my comforts and enjoyments here, sacrifice my affection to relatives and friends, and go where God, in his providence, shall see fit to place me."

Ann became sick and died only a few years into their ministry.

Judson spent 38 years there until his death at 61.

Judson organized and published the Burmese dictionary.

Judson translated the Bible into the Burmese language.

Judson wrote gospel tracts and distributed tens of thousands in the first 6-years before seeing his first convert.

Judson preached the gospel faithfully.

Judson, along with his wife Ann, demonstrated what it was like to deny yourself, take up your cross daily, and follow Christ (Luke 9:23).
