The GOSPEL Starts With CREATION

rticle Highlights: *The Genesis creation account is a controversial topic, even in evangelical churches. *What we believe about creation matters because our beliefs influence our thoughts, determine our actions, and become our lifestyle. *If the Genesis creation account is not true, it undermines the rest of Scripture – including the Gospel. *We must boldly present the full Gospel <u>from</u> Creation to Consummation.

For thus says the LORD, who created the heavens, who is God, who formed the earth and made it, who has established it, who did not create it in vain, who formed it to be inhabited: "I am the LORD and there is no other." Isaiah 45:18.

The opening words of Scripture are fairly simple: "In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth" Genesis 1:1. Why is there often pushback on this truth among *Christians*? It's not surprising in the academic world, where anything that resembles "God" is denigrated out of hand. It's also relatively easy to understand why those Christian denominations that have long been influenced by secular and political pragmatism would slowly slide away from the reality of an omnipotent and omniscient Creator to whom they must one day answer.

But what about evangelical churches? Many insist that they believe the Bible and yet either avoid dealing

with the foundational message of a recent creation or brush the topic away like a pesky doctrine that doesn't matter. Even some pastors resist identifying the Lord Jesus as the Creator (as the Scriptures absolutely and very clearly insist) while demanding that the gospel be boldly declared.

Interpreting Genesis. Why must we interpret the Genesis narrative literally? Those who ask this question believe science proved long ago that the early chapters of Genesis aren't real history. After all, everybody knows that Earth is billions of years old and that natural selection caused life to evolve as we know it – right?

Many believers don't see why the Creation account is so important. They would rather enjoy the beauty of a creation allegory and focus on the God who loves us and sent His Son to die so we might live with Him forever. Does the way we interpret Genesis really make a difference?

If Genesis is not true, then the rest of Scripture becomes an unworkable contradiction.

<u>Ideas Have Consequences.</u> If the world's philosophers have agreed on anything, it is that what one believes determines how one thinks. Millions of words have been written on this truth. The ideas that a person embraces in their belief system – their worldview – will dominate their thinking process so completely that the

out-flow of reasoning will be a seamless consequence of those beliefs.

What you believe controls how you think! In other words, your belief system dominates the way you reason. So, your conclusions are bound to be in agreement with what you believe. However sophisticated a counter-argument may be expressed, once you embrace a worldview, no amount of reasoning will shift your conclusions away from the core idea. And actions follow in harmony with the conclusions.

<u>What you think controls</u> <u>what you do!</u> The more often an action is repeated, the more automatic it becomes. Activity patters, also known as habits, develop with ease! Certain behavior becomes comfortable and pleasurable. And soon we find rational justification for our habits from the association of like-minded friends who have either been drawn to us or us to them by that very behavior.

<u>What you do controls</u> <u>your lifestyle?</u> Now we have an endless loop. Our belief system controls reasoning and mental imagery; the mental concepts generate activity in harmony with the core belief; then the activity becomes ingrained as habitual behavior. Finally, the motivational encouragement of those with similar ideas reinforces and enriches our belief system.

<u>To Believe or Not to Be-</u> <u>lieve?</u>

Many believers think creation is an irrelevant is-

sue, but the opposite is true. There are few things more important to our faith because if you believe the Genesis account <u>is not true</u>, then nothing in Scripture is dependable. Once you embrace the idea that the early chapters of Genesis are not historically accurate, then <u>everything</u> in the Bible is subject to <u>personal</u> preference. If God's Word<u>is not a God-inspired</u> record of God's words, then it's nothing more than man's words – and, therefore, just as viable as a Hollywood movie script, a *New York Times* bestseller, or a gossip piece on the evening news.

If, on the other hand, <u>"every word of God is pure"</u> (Proverbs 30:5), then <u>'all Scripture is given by inspira-</u> tion of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness, that the man of God may be complete, thoroughly equipped for every good work" (2 Timothy 3:16-17).

Either Scripture is completely accurate and authoritative, or it is not. Even if we were to assign certain passages to a "suspicious' category that questions either the accuracy of the words or the historicity of the account, how would we determine which selections to accept and which to abort? Whose criteria would suffice for us to use as the standard of approval?

If Genesis is not true, then the rest of Scripture becomes an unworkable contradiction.

<u>Genesis Matters.</u> How we view Genesis impacts our belief system. The first three chapters clearly insist that an *omnipotent* and *omniscient* <u>Creator</u> brought a "very good" universe into existence by His word (Genesis 1:31; 2 Peter 3:5), and set Adam and Eve as stewards over that

<u>Creation</u> (Genesis 1:26; Psalm 8:5-8), and then passed judgment on that creation when Adam rebelled against the Creator's authority (Genesis 3:17-19); 1 Timothy 2:14). That historical framework helps us understand all of human history and our desperate need for Christ's redemption.

As the whole of Scripture and the sweeping testimony of science confirm, the entire Universe "groans and labors" under God's judgment (Genesis 3:17; romans 8:22). This ongoing reality affirms that:

Adam's sin is the cause of God's judgment (Genesis 3:17).

Death is the end result for every human (Romans 5:12; Hebrews 9:27).

Death impacts all of creation (Romans 8:22).

Death is the last enemy to be destroyed (1 Corinthians 15:26).

On the other hand, if death has been around for millions of years, then sin <u>is not</u> the cause for death, and death becomes a part of the regular process that brings

about the "better" good because it's the mechanism that enables the "fit" to survive. In the Bible, death is an intrusion – <u>a judgment</u>. If, however, the Bible is wrong and death is nothing more than the means by which the inferior are weeded out, then

Death cannot be the payment for sin.

The death of Christ was unnecessary.

The Gospel is both foolish and irrelevant.

The entire Gospel message stands or falls on the historicity and accuracy of Genesis. This book of beginnings lays the foundation for the rest of Scripture. If you destroy the Bible's credibility, then it is <u>easy</u> to deny the Bible's Creator.

The Creation enables us to clearly see God's Eternal Power and His Divine Nature (Romans 1:20). God is the owner; we are the stewards. God is the source of all power; we only use or adapt what we are given. God is the only Holy One; all Creation and all created beings are under the curse of sin. God is the Omniscient One; we are finite and inferior.

GENESIS AND THE COMPLETE GOSPEL

The Gospel message depends on <u>who</u> JESUS is as much as *what* He did. The world began when He created it (Genesis 1:1; John 1:1-2). Through His work on the Cross and subsequent Burial and Resurrection, the Lord Jesus opened the way through which fallen humanity can be redeemed (1 Corinthians 15:1-4). And His work will finally be consummated when He returns to claim His own and <u>"every knee</u> (will) <u>bow, of those in heaven and</u> of those on earth, and of those under the earth, and that every tongue... confess that Jesus Christ is Lord" (Philippians 2:10-11).

It is the responsibility of all twice-born to present the complete Gospel Message. If we neglect the Creation, then we negate the Omnipotence of God and nullify His Omniscience. If we neglect the Cross, then we eliminate the sinless substitution of the only righteous man who can satisfy the Holiness of God and administer the Justice of the only ONE able to justify. If we neglect the consummation promised by the Creator who died in our stead on the Cross, then there is no hope of Eternal Life in absolute righteousness.

We are back to Genesis. It all starts there. If Genesis is true, then we can trust the rest of Scripture that **"there is no other name under heaven given among men by which we must be saved"** (Acts 4:12).

Grace Alone

"For the grace of God that brings salvation has appeared to all men, ...not by work of righteousness which we have done, but according to His mercy he saved us, through the washing of regeneration and renewing of the Holy Spirit whom He poured out on us abundantly through Jesus Christ our Savior."


Thankfully some who came before us stood against the rising tide of their day. The question we face is: Will we do likewise in our time?

Ninety Percent of Pomona College Students Say Climate Chills Free Speech

A survey conducted by Gallup and the Knight Foundation found that many students at the liberal arts college in Claremont, California do not feel comfortable expressing their political views with their professors or piers.

Eighty-eight percent of students agreed that the climate on campus prevent students and faculty "from saying things they believe because others might find them offensive." Slightly more than half of all college students nationwide said the same. Among the Pomona College faculty, 63 percent agreed the climate has a hilling effect on potentially offensive speech.

Self-identified "very liberal" students expressed the least anxiety with sharing their political views. Seventy-two percent said they are comfortable discussing their political beliefs with their professors, and 85 percent said they have no trouble talking about politics with their peers...

Animus Toward Country and Free Market Capitalism Begins in Elementary School

As author William J. Federer explains, animus to-

"There is actually a socialist-communist tactic called 'deconstruction' where you separate a people from their past, get them into a neutral position where they do not remember where they came from; then you can easily brainwash them into whatever future you have planned for them," he writes in his book, <u>Who is the King in America and Who Are the Counselors to the King?</u> (Amerisearch Inc, 2017).

The dovetails with the socialist credo to build the "new socialist man" on the ashes of previous societies. It's why the left tears down statues and recast great figures of the past like Christopher Columbus and Thomas Jefferson as monsters – if they mention them at all in the history textbooks.

In fact, the most influential history text of the last several decades is Howard Zinn's <u>A People's History of</u> <u>the United States</u>. This essentially Marxist book prints a picture of America as an evil empire...

Healthiest amount of alcohol may be none

To minimize health risks, the optimal amount of alcohol someone should consume is none. That's the simple, surprising conclusion of a massive study, co-authored by 512 researchers from 243 institutions, published Thursday in the Lancet.

The researchers built a database of more than a thousand alcohol studies and data sources, as well as death and disability records from 195 countries and territories between 1990 and 2016. The goal was to estimate how much alcohol affects the risk of 23 health problems. The number that jumped out, in the end, was zero. Anything more than that was associated with health risks.

"What has been underappreciated, what's surprising, is that no amount of drinking is good for you," said Emmanuela Gakidou, a professor of global health at the University of Washington and the senior author of the report.

"People should no longer think that a drink or two a day is good for you. What's best for you is to not drink at all," she said.

The report found that 2.8 million people across the globe died in 2016 of alcohol-related causes, which is about the same proportionally as the 2.0 million who died in 1990. For people ages 15 to 49, alcohol is the leading risk factor for experiencing a negative health outcome.

This is a sobering report for the roughly 2 billion people who drink alcohol. The report challenges the controversial hypothesis that moderate drinking provides a clear health benefit. That notion took hold in the 1990s after news reports on the "French paradox": The French have relatively low rates of heart disease despite a fatty diet. Some researchers pointed to red wine consumption among the French as potentially protective.

Numerous peer-reviewed studies found evidence that people who have a drink or two a day are less likely to have heart disease than people who abstain or drink excessively.

But the new study, while noting the lower risks of heart disease from moderate drinking, as well as a dip in the diabetes rate in women, found that many other health risks offset and overwhelm the health benefits. That includes the risk of breast cancer, larynx cancer, stroke, cirrhosis, tuberculosis, interpersonal violence, self-harm and transportation accidents.

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Watchful Care

"Do not I fill heaven and earth?" declares the LORD." Jeremiah 23:24

(Please read also: Jeremiah 23:20-24)

Before he raced out the door to school, I asked my son if he had brushed his teeth. Asking again, I reminded him of the importance of telling the truth. Unmoved by my gentle admonishment, he half jokingly informed me that what I really needed was a security camera in the bathroom. Then I could check for myself if he had brushed his teeth and he wouldn't be tempted to lie.

While the presence of a security camera may help remind us to follow the rules, there are still places we can go unnoticed or ways we can avoid being seen Although we may evade or trick a security camera, we fool ourselves if we think we are ever outside the gaze of God.

God asks, "*Who can hide in secret places so that I* <u>cannot see them</u>?" (Jeremiah 23:24). There is both an encouragement and a warning in his question.

The warning is that we cannot hide from God. We can't outrun or fool him. Everything we do is visible to Him.

The encouragement I find is that there is no place on earth or in the heavens where we are outside the watchful care of our heavenly Father. Even when we feel alone, God is with us. (Ed. Provided that we know JESUS as our personal care provider and to know HE knows/sees even our thoughts AND HE sees the thoughts of both the saved and lost sinner!) No matter where we go today may the awareness of that truth encourage us to choose obedience to His Word and receive comfort – He watches over us.

Lord Jesus, thank You that there is nowhere I can go that is outside of Your loving gaze. Knowing You see me, help me to honor You with my words and actions.

We are never outside the watchful care of our heavenly Father.

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The Burning Bush – Part III

This is the third in a series of articles about the encounter of Moses with God at the Burning Bush in Exodus chapter three. This encounter will show us the character and nature of God. This should be the goal of every true Christian – To know God for Who He is in His fulness – as expressed in John 17:3, "And this is eternal life, that they may know Thee, the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom Thou hast sent."

I saw a documentary of a village of people. I didn't recognize where they were from, but they lived near a volcano. They gave offerings and sacrifices down the throat of that volcano. The thought was that they would appease the god of the volcano so that it wouldn't erupt against them. You see, the god of this volcano was far away and he wasn't very happy either. If they didn't bring these sacrifices – he would become angry and erupt against them.

God the Transcendent

I wonder if we perceive the Lord God that way. As we study the character and nature of God, we might come to the same conclusion that these village people did – that God is far away in heaven. We can look at the heavens and the galaxies – especially now with high-powered telescopes – and see the vastness of the whole created order. We realize that God is on His throne SOMEWHERE DISTANT ruling over all of this.

In fact, He is transcendent over time itself (v. 6). He states that He is the God of the Patriarchs. These people lived over 400 years ago, yet God speaks about them in the present tense - "I am the God" not "I Was the God."

As such, God is distant and not connected with us. It's not like you can walk up to Him and have a conversation with Him here on earth. Even when we go to church we don't actually see Him or hear Him audibly. God can seem like just a distant person, or perhaps just a philosophy of life and morality, and not a personal living God. In fact, 56% of people polled believe that God is just a non-personal force.

In addition to this is God's Holiness (v. 5). When Moses tried to come near to God, he was told to stop. God's Holiness and our sinfulness means that there is a separation between us. Even if we wanted to come up close to God, we are not able to do so. It's almost like God has a sign posted stating: "KEEP OUT!"

When we consider these things about God, we might come to the same conclusion that the people in the village did about the volcano god. He is distant from us and you can't approach directly. If you don't appease Him with offerings and sacrifices, He will erupt against you. Part of this belief is true to a point. God is distant from His creation. He is transcendent above all things and therefore remains distant. As a Spirit being in heaven, He is separate from all creation and all people.

But the Lord is also very different from this:

God the Imminent

God is also up close and personal with people. This is what we see in this encounter with Moses. **God Hears (2:23; 3:9)**. When the Pharaoh of Egypt died, the people cried out to God. When they cried out to God, He heard them. They weren't just crying out to thin air or just the wall inside. They were crying out to God, and when they did, God heard them. God is now hearing what human people have to say to Him, and He is hearing in a way that He understands the dilemma they are in and knows what's going on. Isn't that nice to know when we cry out to God?

God also Sees (2:25; 3:7, 9). After God heard their groaning, He looked down upon the people (2:25). God not only sees what's going on, but He sees in a way that He is going to do something about their problem. (3:7, 9) Here you see the mercy and compassion of the Lord for His people. In other words, it's not only that God can see what's going on in people's lives, but His seeing is connected with His heart for His people. This is further demonstrated when:

God Comes Down (v. 8). The transcendent God who is removed from His creation is suddenly in the here and now. He is no longer just an impersonal God sitting on a throne off somewhere in heaven. God is now present on the earth, specifically among His people. When He comes down, God acts on behalf of His people **TO DELIVER!(v. 8)**. God not only comes down to dwell, but He also comes to be a Warrior on behalf of His people.

God Will Be With His people (v. 12). God promised Moses that He would be with Him personally. How much more up close and personal can you get than this? Can you think of any greater thing than to have the Almighty accompanying you on your journey? Think what a relief this would be to the ears of Moses as he is getting ready to go against Pharaoh. Pharaoh might be the greatest in the land, but God is the greatest of all – Period!

God is concerned about His People personally (v. 16). God does not sit in heaven aloof of all the evil that takes place in the world. He has a concern for people and for all the injustice that takes place in the world. I get the impression that God knew all along what was happening in Egypt, and that He was concerned about it. But He didn't decide to act UNTIL the people cried out to Him (2:23). It makes you wonder why the people waited so long to cry out to God for help. Perhaps this was their last resort and not their first.

All of these promises are now ours in Jesus!

What God promised to be for Moses is now ours in Jesus. Jesus is this God of Moses made flesh, "And the Word became Flesh and dwelt among us" (John 1:14). The transcendent God oft he Universe is now here as a real live human being – **God Came Down (v. 8)** God is now up close and personal and present to us. People could then see and touch God directly and converse back and forth with Him. God Himself is now Up Close and Personal with People directly – as a human Himself. Everything that God promised to be for Moses is what Jesus is to us now.

1) Just as God saw all that was happening in Egypt to His people, Jesus now sees what is happening in your life. He is not ignorant to the things that you are facing because He sees. Jesus could see into places He had not been and even into people's hearts, so He sees you.

2) Just as God Heard the cries of His people, so Jesus hears when you call upon Him. He could hear when people called upon Him, even when they were far away. So every time that you call upon the Lord, He will hear.

3) Just as God dwelled Personally With Moses, so Jesus dwells personally with Us. "Christ in me, the hope of Glory" (Col. 1:23). Jesus is now Up Close and Personal to us. He not only lives with us, but He desires to Live INSIDE Us. That's why we talk of Jesus being your own PERSONAL Savior.

4) Just as God was Concerned about His People, so Jesus is concerned about what is happening in your life. When Jesus was called to the death of Lazarus, He loved Mary and Martha and was moved with compassion for them and the others and "Jesus Wept" (John 11:35). This is the concern that Jesus has for you. Do you believe this? Jesus is concerned for you and the oppression you are experiencing.

Now that Jesus has ascended back to heaven, we now have the Holy Spirit. God is now up close and personal to us all the time. All the blessing of the Up Close and Personal Savior can now come to each one of us. When Jesus was here physically, He could only be in one place at a time, and deal with those people there. But now the Holy Spirit is given to all who receive Christ as their Savior, and the up close and personal God is with Us all the time

He is ever present to Help you, because that is one of His titles – The Helper (Jhn. 14:26).

What do we learn about the character and nature of God from this encounter?

God is distant in His Office as Ruler of the Universe. He is also up close and personal to people.

He comes to be the personal Helper to your life – To be ever present and concerned about you and your problems of life. This He has done in Jesus – God Has Come Down to this world to be present with People.

The Holy Spirit now resides in the heart of all believers and He brings all those blessings of Jesus to us all the time. Have you availed yourself of the presence and help that the Lord wants to bring to your life? Or do you go to Him only as a last resort?

"O come let us worship and bow down: let us kneel before the Lord our maker." (Psalm 95:6)

There is something symbolic in kneeling before God. It typifies the heart's relation to Him.

First, it signifies respect. True, we come to our Father when we pray. But He is the almighty Father who dwells in heaven. We have broken His Law and deserve His wrath. We can demand nothing. But He has in His mercy told us to come. Therefore, we seek Him. But we approach Him with respect. We kneel.

Next, the bended knees signify the bended will. When we pray we do not try to assert our own will. We confidently bring our petitions to God. But we leave the answering of our prayers to Him, and always add: <u>Not</u> <u>my will be done, but Thine.</u>

"O come, let us kneel before the Lord our maker."

"O worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness." (Psalm 96:9)

Adoration is the highest rung on the ladder of prayer. From that rung it is not far to heaven's blessedness.

Prayer begins with a sigh, <u>"God be merciful to me a</u> (the) <u>sinner.</u>" It continues as the soul brings its <u>peti-</u> *tions* to God. From petitions prayer advances to thanksgiving. Joy follows thanksgiving. The more we give thanks the more we find for which to be thankful. The greatness and the goodness of God increases as we consider them. After a while the thanksgiving proceeds to adoration. The soul is filled with praise of God's love and majesty. The bands of the tongue are loosed, and the heart overflows. **"Thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory forever and ever."**

"O worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness."

"Ye that love the Lord, hate evil." (Psalm 97:10)

The Death Penalty – <u>Yes</u> or No?

For years the use of the death penalty (capital punishment) has been a subject of debate with passionate advocates on both sides.

In the political arena, most conservatives, though not all, have favored the death penalty for what are typically called capital offenses. At the same time, most liberals, though not all, are totally opposed to it.

In 'Christian' circles the divide is quite similar. Those who identify as conservative Bible believers are more likely to say <u>yes</u> to the use of the death penalty while those who are more liberal will likely say <u>no</u>.

At this moment right here in Nashville we have a big brouhaha going on about the pending execution of a criminal. In this case, the stalling tactic being employed centers around whether or not lethal injection is a humane way to do it.

Then on July 27 there was a big announcement from the Vatican in Rome. Catholic doctrine for many years had allowed the death penalty in extreme cases, but the current pope now says that it should not be used in any case. This announcement made news because it changed Catholic doctrine; but it really is not a surprise, because this pope is by almost any standard of measurement a liberal.

But the real issue here is not what the Catholics, the Baptists or anyone else has to say! The questions we should be asking are:

- 1. Has God said anything on this;
- 2. If He has, what did He say;
- 3. Does the Bible address the matter?

Well, the fact is, yes, the Lord has addressed it. Although I'm not going to be exhaustive here, let's look in the Bible and see.

In the Old Testament:

"Whoso sheddeth man's blood by man shall his blood be shed: for in the image of God made he man" Genesis 9:6.

"But if any man hate his neighbor, and lie in wait for him, and rise up against him, and smite him mortally that he die, and fleeth into one of these cities: Then the elders of his city shall send and fetch him thence, and deliver him unto the hand of the avenger of blood that he may die" Deut. 19:11-12.

In the New Testament:

"For rulers are not a terror to good works, but to the evil. Wilt thou then not be afraid of the power? Do that

In II Corinthians, chapters 8 and 9, the Scriptural standards for successful stewardship are recorded. We recognize them and report them to you in this brief study. Scriptural stewardship, successful stewardship is to be done

1. Personally – "As ye abound in everything...see that ye abound in this grace also" – II Corinthians 8:7. "Every man according as he purposeth in his heart, so let him give" – II Corinthians 9:7.

2. Purposefully – "As he purposeth in his heart, so let him give" – II Corinthians 9:7. "And beyond their power the were willing of themselves" – II Corinthians 8:3.

3. Positively – "....not grudgingly, or of necessity: for God loveth a cheerful giver" – II Corinthians 9:2.


"Their deep poverty abounded unto the riches of their liberality" – II Corinthians 8:2.

4. Patiently – "How that in a great trial of affliction the abundance of their joy and their deep poverty abounded" – II Corinthians 8:2. "He which soweth sparingly shall reap also sparingly; and he which soweth bountifully shall reap also bountifully" – II Corinthians 9:6.

5. Proportionately – "A ye abound in every thing ... See that ye abound in this grace also. It is accepted according to that a man hath and not according to that he hath not. He that had gathered much had noting over; and he that had gathered little had no lack" – II Corinthians 8:7, 12, 15. "He which soweth sparingly shall reap also sparingly; and he which soweth bountifully shall reap also bountifully" – II Corinthians 9:6.

6. Practically – "that s there was a readiness to will, so there may be a performance also out of that which ye have. For if there be first a willing mind...But by an equality, that now at this time your abundance may be a supply for their want. Providing for honest thing... Show ye to them...the proof of your love" – II Corinthians 8:11, 12, 14, 21, 24.

7. **Presently** – "But first gave their own selves to the Lord, and unto us ... abound in this grace also. Now therefore perform the doing of it. ... now at this time" – II Corinthians 8:5, 7, 11, 14.
